#### THE MASK OF SANITY

The Mask of Sanity is a book written in 1941 by the American psychiatrist, Hervey Cleckley and it is still considered a classic. Cleckley noted that many people suffer from psychological disorders which create havoc in their own lives. They appear to be outwardly normal and functioning people, able to mask their basic lack of inner personal character. They suffer from internal chaos which leaves a track record of destructive behavior – often more selfdestructive than destructive to others-yet, destructive, just the same.

Among the personality considered traits "psychologically problematic," Cleckley listed some of the following "common" in (listed terms):

-superficial charm -irrational thinking -unreliability

-insincerity

-lack of remorse -poor judgment -lack of "having feelings" -egocentricity -incapacity to love

In essence, then, we hide our disorders, bad habits, imperfections, and hangups behind the "mask" of "acting normal." At some point, however, the very issues that haunt us behind "the mask" come out to bite us, pulling us into a world of inner and possibly "outer" darkness.

Taking off this "mask" and actually dealing with the spiritual and emotional imperfections that pull us away from happiness matter is o f "confession," at least in the sense of admitting the fact that they are a part of our inner lives. But. "confession" is incomplete without repentance and forgiveness. Adding the acts of repentance and forgiveness contributes to turning our "confession"

into the Sacrament of Holy Confession. This Sacrament is the "heart monitor" of one's personal spiritual life as an Orthodox Christian.

This brings us to the Orthodox Spiritual Life: a discipline of prayer, worship and genuine Sacramental participation.

Examples of such an Orthodox Christian Spiritual Life-Style can be found in the lives of the Saints of our Church. On October 20th, we will commemorate one Saint: St. Gerasimos of Cephallonia.

Other such Saints include St. Seraphim of Sarov and a more modern figure, known as the Elder Joseph the Hesychast, whose letters on Spiritual Life were published in a book, entitled Monastic Wisdom, issued from the Orthodox Christian Monastery in Arizona in 1998:

"All the yearning of the soul should absorb God...And each one of us, being but clay, should return 'Thine own of Thine own.'" (pg. 326).

Elder Joseph's words for the soul "to absorb God," are synonymous with St. Seraphim of Sarov saying that our goal in life is to acquire the Holy Spirit. Among Sarov's sayings are the following: "Acquire a peaceful spirit, and around you thousands will be saved.... Where there is God, there is no evil. Everything coming from God is peaceful, healthy and leads a person to the judgment of his own imperfections and humility...The devil is like a lion, hiding in ambush (Ps 10:19, 1Pe 5:8). He secretly sets out nets of unclean and unholy thoughts. So, it is necessary to break them off as soon as we notice them, by means of pious reflection and prayer. It is necessary that the Holy Spirit enter our heart. Everything good that we do, that we do for Christ, is given to us by the Holy Spirit, but prayer most of all, which is always available to us." This is the Spiritual Life: prayer in the grace of the Holy Spirit, Who gives us knowledge of Christ our God.

The Spiritual Life is the genuine life of sanity; to-day's mundane life is "insanity" masked as "sanity." Behaviors which were once in violation of traditional Christian morality are now "masked" as "understandable" - maybe even acceptable – norms often requiring a degree of social tolerance, up to the point where they break the law. The words of such Saints as St. Seraphim of Sarov and the life-style of such Saints as St. Gerasimos are perceived as being "out of step" by many who choose to hide the many psychological, spiritual and emotional disorders of people behind the "mask" of "normal" "abnormalities," seeking more acceptance than repentance.

Lest we would be deceived into thinking that we are all "odd balls," let us note that Spiritual Life involves "fighting the good fight," against demons who attack us all. Our initial rejection of demons is at our baptism in Christ, when we enter a Spiritual way of life, daily fighting against the impulses and temptations egged on by demons. Let us keep the prayer that is read at our baptism constantly in our minds: "Let all adverse powers be crushed beneath the signing of Your Most Holy Cross."

#### **ECCLESIASTICAL NEW YEAR**



Dearly Beloved,

Today we begin anew. With the inauguration of another ecclesiastical year, the cycle of the Church calendar begins again. Feasts and fasts will lead us through the life of our Lord and Savior, His Mother, and remember the saints of our Church. Like any new beginning, the Church gives us another opportunity to observe with greater devotion the life in Christ.

A new year also brings with it fresh opportunities to strengthen the lives of our parishes. We can look back on the previous years, learn from them, and use those lessons to freshen up our ministries, bring new energy to them, and edify and inspire those who serve in them, so that the Gospel of Christ can be preached more effectively and rise up over the noise in our often cacophonous society. As we read in the Book of Proverbs, "Wisdom cries aloud in the street; in the markets she raises her voice." (Proverbs 1:20). The faithful of our Church must hear the words of the Lord, but we must be the ones who speak it to them. Our words must also become actions of service to one another in our parishes, but also to the community around us.

We must also raise our voices about the ills our world faces today. We have the freedom to contact our elected officials and the media to highlight the issues. We cannot waste that freedom on trivial matters, as we often do. First, we must raise our voices about the sufferings and persecutions of Christians in the Middle East and Africa. Christianity is steadily being erased from the lands where it began and the lands we look to for our Orthodox Tradition. We cannot allow our brothers and sisters who face deadly threats on a daily basis to believe that they have been abandoned.

Second, our Archdiocese has become actively involved with the United Nations Economic and Social Council in the campaign to end violence continued on the next page ---->

against women. As we have learned, violence against women takes many forms, from trafficking, physical and sexual violence, to forced impoverishment. This violence damages the image of God in which each person is created, and as a Church, we must work to intensify awareness on this issue among our parishes and to raise our voices and actions to address it.

Third, in keeping with the long standing practice of our Ecumenical Patriarchate, we must continue to speak out about environmental issues, from the continuing destruction of ecosystems from human activity to the new opportunities for environmental sustainability through new technologies and better stewardship of our natural resources.

As our Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew has stated, "The way we respond to the natural environment directly reflects the way we treat human beings. The willingness to exploit the environment is revealed in the willingness to permit avoidable human suffering. So the survival of the natural environment is also the survival of ourselves. When we will understand that a crime against nature is a crime against ourselves and sin against God?"

As we read these words we must take note that His All Holiness has been teaching us about our responsibility for the created world from the first day of his enthronement as Ecumenical Patriarch, November 2, 1991. To commemorate this historic twenty-fifth anniversary, I hope that each parish of our Metropolis will send him a congratulatory message, especially praising his exemplary leadership at the Holy and Great Council of the Orthodox Church this past June, but also his tireless dedication to the Church and humanity. May he have many years, rightly teaching the Word of Truth!

Dearly beloved, there is so much work to do as Christians, in our parishes, in our homes and in the world. The theme of our Clergy-Laity Congress taught us "You are the Voice of Christ in a Changing World." May this New Ecclesiastical

Year, a new beginning, give you the inspiration to be the voice of God's message.

### FEAST OF THE HOLY GREAT MARTYR DEMETRIOS

As we know, the Church went through difficult times, especially when the Roman Empire decided to persecute and oppress Christi-



anity. The greatest test to the Church was the great persecution under Diocletian, which took place from 300 A.D. until after 306 A.D. When this great test took place, the Church was changing a lot. One of the reasons the Empire saw Christianity as a threat was how much the Church had changed.

In the Empire, a great number of people believed in Christ. In some areas, even senatorial families had accepted and loved Christ. Man soldiers, even officers, were converted Christians. Even relatives of Roman governors were converts. What was the Empire to do with these citizens who did not worship the Greek and Roman gods or salute the Emperor as a divine person (not common in the West, but assumed in the East)?

Some leaders were open to "Eastern religions," while others, such as Galerius, Diocletian, and others saw this new religion as a great threat to the culture of the Roman Empire. Here was a religion which deified a criminal who was crucified by a Roman magistrate. In response to the growing tide of Christianity, Diocletian ordered that one would have to offer sacrifice to the Emperor in order to be a "legal" citizen, or face changes equal to treason.

St. Demetrios was a Roman officer who believed in Christ. This was the kind of thing that annoyed the Roman emperors. The martyrdom of St. Demetrios took place in Thessaloniki, which was Galerius' capitol. He had been denounced by fellow soldiers for being a Christian and he was imprisoned. The St. Demetrios Cathedral in Thessaloniki is the site of his burial, following his death as a martyr. His Feast Day is **October 26th.** 

But first, a young Christian named Nestor gained the blessing of St. Demetrios to fight a giant named Lyaios, since Galerius wanted pagans to fight Christians. It was a David versus Goliath situation, and Nestor won the fight. The angry emperor had both Nestor and Demetrios put to death. Under the St. Demetrios Cathedral to this day, one can see the bath house where he had been imprisoned. He is called "Myrrh-streaming," since in Byzantine times, a miraculous flow of fragrant myrrh emanated from his tomb.

The Adult Coloring Group kicked off the new Ecclesiastical year with a coloring session and luncheon on Friday, September 16th.



Twelve parishioners joined us and enjoyed a Martha Stewart inspired luncheon of French Bistro style lentil soup, salmon on rye canapés, prosciutto & fig crepe roll-ups, roasted chickpeas, and fresh watermelon slices. After lunch the group began the coloring session with many attendees bringing their own coloring books with them to work on while others opted for selecting one of the provided coloring pages. A raffle completed the session with everyone taking home a small raffle prize.

Adult coloring began as a fad about a year and a half ago and has developed into a full-on craze. One can purchase coloring books and supplies at many locations now, including Michael's craft store, Barnes & Noble bookstore, & even your local pharmacy and grocery stores. It seems to be everywhere! There's a good reason for this. Let me tell you about my discovery.

My journey with adult coloring and other art inspired hobbies began in the hospital as a daily therapy while being treated for leukemia. The hospital provided a voluntary two hour "recreational therapy" session every day, which was attended with other cancer patients. The

sessions helped by providing focus for the patients, so that for a period of time, one could briefly, not think about their cancer and focus on creativity. The coloring, for me, helped dealing with the side effects of treatment. But it was not only the coloring, but the interaction and conversation between others that is the true bonus and reward of adult coloring! So, as a result of this experience, we at St. George now can participate in the benefits and healing power of art and conversation with others during the sessions. We invite all to join us!

# HOLY AND GREAT SYNOD OF THE ORTHODOX CHRISTIAN CHURCH: THE SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE

#### On Orthodox Marriage-Part 1

1. The institution of the family is threatened today by such phenomena as secularization and moral relativism. The Orthodox Church maintains, as her fundamental and indisputable teaching, that marriage is sacred. The freely entered union of man and woman is an indispensable precondition for marriage.

- 2. In the Orthodox Church, marriage is considered to be the oldest institution of divine law because it was instituted simultaneously with the creation of Adam and Eve, the first human beings (Gen 2:23). Since its origin, this union not only implies the spiritual communion of a married couple—a man and a woman—but also assured the continuation of the human race. As such, the marriage of man and woman, which was blessed in Paradise, became a holy mystery, as mentioned in the New Testament where Christ performs His first sign, turning water into wine at the wedding in Cana of Galilee, and thus reveals His glory (Jn 2:11). The mystery of the indissoluble union between man and woman is an icon of the unity of Christ and the Church (Eph 5:32).
- 3. Thus, the Christocentric typology of the sacrament of marriage explains why a bishop or a presbyter blesses this union with a special prayer...The sacredness of the God-established union and the lofty spiritual content of married life explain the affirmation: *So that marriage should be honored among all, and the bed undefiled* (Heb 13:4). That is why the Orthodox Church condemns any defilement of its purity (Eph 5:2-5; 1 Thes 4:4; Heb 13:4ff).
- 4. A necessary condition of marriage is faith in Jesus Christ, which must be shared by the bridegroom and the bride, man and woman. Consequently, unity in Christ is the foundation of marital unity. Thus, marital love blessed by the Holy Spirit enables the couple to reflect the love between Christ and the Church as a mystery of the Kingdom of God—as the eternal life of humanity in the love of God.
- 5. Protecting the sacredness of marriage has always been crucially important for the preservation of the family, which reflects the communion of the persons yoked together both in the *Continued on the next page* ---->

Church and in society at large...an essential and creative spiritual force in the sacred institution of the family. It alone ensures the safety and formation of children, both for the spiritual mission of the Church as well as in the life of society.

- 6. It was always with the necessary strictness and proper pastoral sensibility, in the compassionate manner of Paul, Apostle of the Gentiles (Rom 7:2-3; 1 Cor 7:12-15, 39), that the Church treated both *the positive preconditions* (difference of sexes, legal age, etc.) and *the negative impediments* (kinship by blood and affinity, spiritual kinship, an existing marriage, difference in religion, etc.) for [an Orthodox Christian] joining in marriage...
- 7. Given our current context, which is unfavorable for the sacrament of marriage and the sacred institution of family, hierarchs and shepherds must actively cultivate their pastoral work in order to protect the faithful, standing by them to fortify their hope shaken by many hardships, and asserting the institution of the family upon an unshakable foundation...since this foundation is the rock which is Christ (Mt 7:25).
- 8. The pressing issue in society today is marriage, which is the center of the family, and the family is what justifies marriage. Pressure to recognize new forms of cohabitation constitutes a real threat for Orthodox Christians...The main victims of these trends are the couples themselves, and especially the children, since regrettably the children often endure great suffering from an early age, while nonetheless bearing no responsibility for the situation.
- 9. A civil marriage between a man and a woman registered in accordance with the law lacks sacramental character since it is a simple legalized cohabitation recognized by the State, different from a marriage blessed by God and the Church. The members of the Church who contract a civil marriage ought to be regarded with pastoral responsi-

bility, which is necessary to help them understand the true meaning of marriage and the blessings connected with it.

- 10. The Church does not allow for her members to contract same-sex unions or any other form of cohabitation apart from marriage. The Church exerts all possible pastoral efforts to help her members who enter into such unions understand the true meaning of repentance and love as blessed by the Church.
- 11. The grave consequences brought about by this crisis of the institutions of marriage and the family are manifested in the frightening increase in the number of divorces, abortions, and other problems of family life. These consequences constitute a great challenge to the mission of the Church in the modern world, which is why the shepherds of the Church are obligated to make every possible effort to address these problems. The Orthodox Church lovingly invites her children and all people of good will to defend this fidelity to the sacredness of the family.

#### STEWARDSHIP UPDATE

Our stewardship total received year-to-date is \$80,303.00. This compares to last year for the same time period of \$105,238.00. We are off (down) by \$24,935.00 or (-24%). At this lower giving level, we are not going to hit our \$130,000.00 annual goal, as we are trending to only \$100,000.00 for the year. This is most concerning.

I feel it is important to bring this to everyone's attention because the church counts on stewardship to pay for the monthly operations of the church. So far this year, expenses have been kept under control even to last year's levels, thanks to our office. However, if our stewardship does not increase, the parish council may be facing some difficult fiscal decisions in the future in regards to our stewardship "crisis" in order to pay our expenses.

As chairperson, it is my responsibility to ask everyone to please reconsider their stewardship commitments. For those who have not yet committed, continued on the next page ---->

please do so, now. For those who have and are giving, please consider giving more, now.


