THANKFUL FOR THE DIVINE LITURGY?

It's the same thing as thanking God for the Bible itself. The Divine Liturgy is also known as the Eucharist (the Greek word for "thanksgiving") and is "the Bible in motion," whereby we are real-life participants in the ongoing heavenly banquet, akin to, if only in a vague traditional way, the thanksgiving fares laid out every year on family dinner tables throughout America.

The Divine Liturgy in itself is the best description and definition of the Kingdom of Heaven! Upon experiencing the Divine Liturgy, the Russian Prince Vladimir's emissaries in 988 AD commented that they "knew not whether they were in heaven or on earth." And, with this, Russia became a Christian nation.

Without the Divine Liturgy, we have no Church. Period. The Divine Liturgy is the Mystical Supper to which we are all invited by our Lord. In and of itself it is quite enough for which to be thankful— "eucharist!"

In his classic book, The Heavenly Banquet, Fr. Emmanuel Hatzidakis gives three reasons for which we express thanksgiving to God in the context of the Divine Liturgy:

"We thank God for three reasons: 1) The first reason for thanking God is for Who He is...'He is always existing and eternally the same...' 2) The second reason for offering thanks to God is for having created us...not only is God our Creator...Should it not be for the sustaining energies of God, we would fall back into non-existence...3) The third reason for offering thanks to God is not only for having created us, but also for having re-created us spiritually by adopting us as His children and granting us life eternal..."(The Heavenly Banquet, pg.234).

1. We thank God for Who

He is. In other words, God creates everything to be good. God is "eternally the same" - a constant goodness. God is the same: In humanity, He still has the "print of the nails and the wound in His side." In His divinity, He is a constant light, which illumines our souls. St. Gregory of Nyssa speaks about the existence of our souls, giving the following example of the relationship between art and the visible paint. The purity of our souls is a common, consistent factor making us a human race. Like the soul, art is the intangible, yet, constant element of a painting. The paint is not of the same element as the art; when a painting is destroyed, the paint is torn apart, but the art still exists and is visible when the paints come together again. - 2) We thank God for creating us. We are God's property! God has made it so that we can know Him through each other. Therefore, our love for one another is evidence of God's love for us and our love for God. Fr. Philotheos Faros points to St. Basil, who noted, "Our Lord Jesus Christ, Who has deigned to style the universal Ekklesia (Church) as His Body,.. has made us individually members one of another..." (Functional and Dysfunctional Christianity, pg. 70). In short, we thank God for each other.
- 3. We thank God for saving us—for not ceasing to do "everything until [He] led us to heaven." In fact, God is Himself thankful! God is thankful for us who seek to do His Will: "O Father,...I have manifested Your Name to those whom You have given Me out of the world. They were Yours; You gave them to Me and they have kept Your word." (St. John 17:5-6). Thankfulness for us is a blessing, so that we can be thankful to God. At the Last Supper (i.e., the very first Divine Liturgy), our Lord gave thanks, "teaching us how we are to celebrate the sacrament; [being thankful] that He comes willingly to His Passion, and [helps us] to accept sufferings with thankfulness, knowing that God can use suffering for ultimate good." (Orthodox Study Bible, pg. 1321).

The willingness of Christ to voluntarily ascend the Cross for us is, in essence, the same willingness that stands behind the whole reality of creation. God creates everything out of Loving Will. The Cross and Resurrection, taken together, is the re-creation to which we are invited to be active participants—i.e., our repentance is our personal re-creation. It is made possible by our Lord's voluntary re-creation of all of humanity, in which the fall of Adam and Eve is reversed. Adam was created and then Eve was brought into being from Adam's rib. Now, the pure flesh of the Mother of God (the New Eve) is the sole fleshcomponent of God's humanity, since He was incarnated by the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary. The flesh of the Ever-Virgin Mary formed the New Adam – our Savior Jesus Christ.

Finally, we are thankful for the great value that God places upon our human lives. The whole reason for the story of our salvation in Christ is expressed in the Divine Liturgy's Thanksgiving Prayer: God values each of us and all of us as being more important than the archangels and angels. "We also thank You for this Liturgy, which You are pleased to accept from our hands, even though You are surrounded by thousands of Archangels, angels; by the Cherubim and the Seraphim, six-winged, many-eyed, soaring with their wings."

Indeed, the Divine Liturgy is the ultimate Thanksgiving meal. We partake of Holy Communion, the very Body and Blood of Christ our True God. "Communion creates community, because God living in us makes us recognize the God in our fellow humans...Communion, that sacred intimacy with God, is not the final moment of the Eucharistic life. We recognized Him, but that recognition is not just for us to savor or to keep a secret...The movement flowing from the Eucharist is the movement from communion to community to ministry. Our experience of communion first sends us to our brothers and sisters to share with them our stories and build with them a body of love. Then, as community, we can move in all directions to reach out to all people." (With Burning Hearts, by Henri J.M. Nouwen, pgs.96, 103, 112).

This witness continues to be offered through the philanthropic ministries of our beloved Ecumenical Patriarchate. GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Special General Assembly for upgrading the parish courtyard and the parish hall was held on **Sunday**, **Oct**-



ober 1, 2017. The General Assembly approved both projects, the costs of which were reported in the October 2017 *The Voice of St. George* newsletter.

At the present time, the concrete patio has been installed in the courtyard. This took place from October 9th through October 16th. In addition, the "re-flooring" project in the parish hall is now in the beginning stages. The process of installing the new porcelain tiles will last through much of the month of November. As a result, Sunday "Coffee Hours;" the normallyscheduled November Fall General Assembly; the annual Veterans Day program and the AHEPA Thanksgiving Luncheon have all been impacted. The re-scheduling and re-formatting of these events are listed in the various related sections of this newsletter.

In particular, the Fall General Assembly Meeting is now scheduled for **Sunday**, **December 10**, **2017**, following the celebration of the Divine Liturgy. Discussion will include the 2018 parish budget; by-law proposals; festival updates and reports regarding the progress of our courtyard and parish hall upgrades. In addition, an auditing committee needs to be formed

Suggestions for increasing the number of parish members will be welcome, as well as suggestions for more spiritual and fellowship-type of events to be scheduled throughout the year.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

At the Parish Council meeting held on Tuesday, October 23, 2017 the following items were discussed:



- 1. Final concerns related to the installation of the new flooring in the parish hall were ironed out. The tables and chairs, as well as all book store items were to be removed from the parish hall so that work could begin on Wednesday, November 1st.
- 2. Coffee hours in the month of November will take place on the patio area outside the kitchen.
- 3. A list of items requiring maintenance was presented and the parish council decided to attend to the following:
 - A. Repair the motor for the vent in the annex.
 - B. Check the water pipes under the floor outside the women's restroom for possible leaks.
 - C. Repair flagstone walk ways leading to the parish hall and offices and outside the classrooms.
 - D. Repair the damaged church pew (damaged from the fall of the Epitaphio when it was carried for the Holy Friday evening procession.)
- 4. The Parish Council voted to hold the Fall General Assembly for our parish on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>December 10</u>, <u>2017</u> following the celebration of the Divine Liturgy.
- 5. George Argyros gave a report regarding the status of the 2018 St. George Festival. Gratitude was expressed to George for his donation of two refrigerator units for Festival storage.
- 6. The members committed themselves to helping draw in new stewards to our St. George parish.

2018 FESTIVAL

The November Festival meeting is scheduled to be held on **Monday**, **November 6**, **2017** at **7:00 p.m.** <u>at Towne Center Café</u> (because of the re-flooring project in our parish hall).

George Argyros, 2018 Festival Chairman, reported to the Parish Council that this year there will be no appetizer booth. Appetizers will be distributed through the dinner and grill lines. The bar sections in the parking lot and the courtyard will be enlarged. There will be additional plate selections in the food line.

JNS NEXT will be responsible for advertising, bill boards, newspapers, and radio. JNS will also advertise our Festival in the <u>Desert Entertainer</u>. Advertising the Festival is estimated to cost around \$15,000. Social media will be an extremely important part of this year's advertising strategy. The Festival "menu pamphlet" Ad Program will feature supporters of our Festival who contribute \$300 for a business logo and/or \$150 for a one-line greeting/ad.

Jim Christopoulos is in charge of all volunteers—the more volunteers, the less need to hire workers.

Underwriting Festival costs will be a major factor in contributing to increased Festival revenue. Monetary donations toward Festival items are always welcome. Please write checks to: <u>St. George Greek Orthodox Church</u>, and write "Festival Donation" on the memo line.

As in the past, Becky Allen will be the Chairperson for Yiayia's Attic, which last year brought in \$3,000 for the Festival. However, she will need more help this year. Volunteers for this important Festival station are most welcome. More details regarding set-up will be provided in the near future.

FR. MATTHEW DAVIS: STS. PHILIP & MATTHEW

During the year various Apostles are celebrated. As many know, in Greece people do not celebrate their birthday, but they celebrate their *name day* in honor of their Patron Saint. All in all, there are thirteen Apostles and four Evangelists who wrote or inspired the four Gospels that we read and use in Church. Philip was an Apostle; but, Matthew was an Apostle *and* Evangelist. So, let's start with Matthew.

Matthew is striking since he changed his name. First, he was known as Levi, which alludes to the Jewish Priesthood. But his life was very much distant from such matters. Matthew had been a tax collector, who raised taxes for Rome or local kings. A tax collector was seen as a collaborator for Rome and, as a consequence, he was feared and despised by the Jewish people. So he changed his name to "Matthew," which in Hebrew means "Gift of God." The Church has a tradition that Matthew first wrote his Gospel in Hebrew, but then it was translated into Greek.

We are told by Mark (2:14) and Luke (5:27) that Jesus called Levi, the tax collector to follow Him. As a tax collector he would have been literate in Aramaic and Greek. After his call, Matthew invited Jesus and others to his home for a feast. On this occasion, Scribes and Pharisees criticized Jesus for eating with tax collectors and sinners, saying, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."

Matthew had his mission to preach the Good News to the Jewish people and this led him to preach to those who lived near Jerusalem. But, he was also guide to Jewish people elsewhere, such as Egypt and Ethiopia, which was heavily influenced by Jewish traditions. Like other Evangelists, he is depicted as one of the living creatures of the Revelation (4:7). The one used is in the form of a winged man. While the Church is clear that Matthew wrote his Gospel in Hebrew or Aramaic, it is less clear where he preached. When one talks about Ethiopia, one thinks of Africa (where Christianity took root). However, this "Ethiopia" may

have been south of the Caspian Sea, where Judaism was well known and where Christianity became strong.

Matthew is celebrated on November 16th, just after the start of the Advent Fast, while Philip is celebrated just before this on November 14th. In Greece, I had a friend who celebrated St. Philip and, later, I adopted a son who was named Philip. Philip used a Greek name and he probably knew Greek and could work with Greeks who were converting to Christ. Philip advised Andrew that some Greeks wanted to know Jesus. During the Last Supper, Philip asked Jesus to show them the Father, which gave Jesus the opportunity to teach all people about the unity of the Father and the Son.

There is one area about Philip's identity that causes confusion. There is a follower who wrote a version of the biography of the Virgin Many and the birth of Christ, who was called Philip the Evangelist. The ancient Church historian, Eusebius, considered both Philips to be the same person, while many considered them to be different. The latter work never became a part of the canon of the Church.

At any rate, Philip worked with the Apostles John and Bartholomew in Asia. When the wife of a Roman Proconsul was converted to Christ, it led to the persecution and crucifixion of Philip and Bartholomew.

The tomb of St. Philip was discovered in Turkey in 2011. The professor who found it remarked that, "The discovery of the tomb of St. Philip, who was a very important figure for Christianity, will make a tremendous impression on the world."






