"LET THIS CUP PASS FROM ME!"

On Thursday, September 14th our Holy Orthodox Church honors the Exaltation of the Holy Life-Giving Cross. It was the mother of Emperor Constantine, St. Helen, who recovered the Holy Cross in 325 A.D. from desecration by unbelievers who had since taken governance over the region of Jerusalem and built a pagan temple to the false goddess Aphrodite over the site where Christ was crucified.

Just prior to His crucifixion, our Savior had entered into prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane, praying to God the Father, saying, "Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from Me. Nevertheless, not as I will, but as You Will." (St. Matthew 26:39).

In his "Address In Opposition to the Marcionists and the Manichaeans,"St. John Chrysostom explains the mysterious truth behind these words offered by Christ our God. The Marcionists and Manicheans were heretics closely aligned to the Gnostics, who held that Christ is not God in the flesh.

Such heretics suggest that this prayer indicates that Jesus went to the Cross unwillingly; that He wanted God the Father to "change His mind" about Christ having to endure death for our salvation. This is not the case. The Holy Spirit, Who "spoke through the prophets," indicated well Christ's physical appearance in the world that the Cross and Resurrection were already accomplished, even if they were to take place in the "future" according to human time. Hence the Will of the Son is always One with the Will of the Father, verifying that Christ went to the Cross voluntarily. St. John explained all of this in his "Address."

The Old Testament prophesies allude to future events they already happened. A few examples illustrate this point:

- 1. In Genesis 49: 9, Jacob utters this prophesy of Christ entering the world through the undefiled nature of the Virgin Mary, saying, "Out of a tender shoot, You sprang up." The Incarnation in Jacob's future is proclaimed in the past tense, as if it The Voice of St. George is has already happened.
- before 2. Isaiah uttered prophesy of Christ' crucifixion, saying, "He was led as a sheep to the slaughter." (Isaiah 53: 7-8) — again, a prophesy uttered in past tense.
 - 3. In Psalm 22, King David said, "They pierced My hands and My feet." Again, the future is proclaimed as an alcompleted ready event.

Indeed, Christ is the fulfillment of prophesy. His Divine Will is the same as that of the Father. After all, it was Christ our God Who said, "For as the Father knows Me, even so know I the Father." (St. John 10:15). We also remember that, after Jesus told the Disciples that He must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things, St. Peter said, "Far be it from You,..." In response, Jesus chastised him saying, "Get behind Me, Satan!" (St. Matthew 16:23).

At the same time, the words of our Lord in Gethsemane, indicates that this prayer is, in fact, a "teaching prayer" offered by our Lord—a prayer enlivening by example the meaning of the Lord's Prayer, which was given to us in response to the request, "Teach us how to pray."

Like the Lord's Prayer, God is addressed by our Lord at Gethsemane as "Father" asking, "Thy Kingdom Come; Thy Will be done...lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil." St. John writes, "Since He commanded [us] to pray, 'lead us not into temptation,' He instructs us in this very precept by putting in practice Himself, saying, 'Father if it be possible, let this cup pass away from me,' thus teaching...us lowliness of mind. We should not plunge into dangers, but rather pray that we may not fall into them. But, if they come upon us, we should bear them and postpone our own will to the Will of God." ("Address to Marcionists," Nicene-Post Nicene Fathers, Series 1, Vol. 10, pg. 206-207).

The Will of God is our salvation through His Only-Begotten Son. Salvation is not a static state of everlasting worldly luxury, however. Instead, we think of salvation as union with God. Metropolitan Kallistos Ware writes, "As Christ said at the Last Supper: 'The glory which Thou hast given Me, I have given to them that they may be one...' Christ enables us to share in the Father's divine glory. He is the bond. Because He is Man, He is one of us (fully human); because He is God, He is one with the Father (fully divine). So, through and in Him we are one with God and the Father's glory becomes our glory...It is through Jesus the God-Man that we are 'ingodded;' 'divinized' and made 'sharers in the divine nature.'" (The Orthodox Way, pg. 98).

ENCYCLICAL FOR THE ECCLESIASTICAL NEW YEAR Beloved in the Lord,



The Feast of the Indiction is upon us, the beginning of the New Ecclesiastical Year. Along with this Feast we also celebrate the American Labor Day holiday. Families and friends will gather one more time in order to mark the end of summer and inaugurate the activities of autumn. Created in the late nineteenth century, the intent of Labor Day was to honor the American worker. We should remember that dimension of this holiday.

The Ecclesiastical year provides us with a new opportunity to renew our labors as individuals, families, and communities of faith. When the Lord began His ministry, He read from the Prophet Isaiah, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release of the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord." (Luke 4:18-19, cf Isaiah 61:1). The Lord has given us a "to do list" to guide our labor. His words should inspire us as we begin this New Year.

Labor is honorable and part of God's plan for humanity. In the Book of Genesis (2:15) we read, "The Lord God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to till it and keep it." The Lord made us responsible for the planet on which we live. Through our labor, Earth sustains us. Through our labor, we have used many natural resources to build and to create amazing cities and cultures, to cure and heal many illnesses and diseases, and to lift up humanity overall. In the Divine Liturgy we offer the natural gifts of God, transformed by

human labor, back to God. That is the meaning of the exclamation in the Liturgy, "Thine own, we offer to Thee..."

In our quest to improve life, we may have forgotten the honorable and potentially divine intent of our labors. We have been overtaken by greed and desires that have led us to misuse our planet's resources and gifts, forgetting that they are gifts from God. A consequence of the fall of Adam, sin, has infected our good and natural desires. As His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew has taught us for nearly three decades, committing a crime against the natural world is a sin. Our Patriarch states, "If human beings were to treat one another's personal property the way they treat the natural environment, we would view that behavior as anti-social and illegal. We would expect legal sanctions and even compensation. When will we learn that to commit a crime against the natural world is also a sin?" This connection means that we must labor to protect the natural world and to restore any damage that human activity and our footprint has caused. But we must also reflect on our labor, how our misdirected desires, have led to these sins against the natural world, resulting in pollution, extinction of God-created flora and fauna and more, and as a result the degradation of human life.

We must also extend our reflections into the other environments in which we live, but especially our life in this society. We must consider the pollution of our contemporary civil discourse. It is not very "civil" at all. It too has been polluted and thus has degraded our lives. As the Assembly of Bishops recently stated, "The Orthodox Church emphatically declares that it does not promote, protect or sanction participation in ... acts of hatred, racism, and discrimination, and proclaims that such beliefs and behaviors have no place in any community based in respect for the law and faith in a loving God." These, too, are sins that separate us from God and divide us from one another; sins for which we must ask God's forgiveness and mercy. We, as faithful members of His Church, must also labor to

protect civil discourse and restore it to the purpose for which it was created, the edification of humanity, to build up the Body of Christ (Ephesians 4:12).

The time is now, my brothers and sisters in the Lord, to embrace the start of the New Ecclesiastical Year and re-purpose our labors: to become instruments of healing, reconciliation, and justice, to become better stewards of the Earth, and better citizens. This New Ecclesiastical Year offers us a new opportunity to recommit ourselves to this task in all our labors.

May the Lord guide your steps throughout this New Year, and may His abiding love grace and mercy be granted to you always.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Beginning in July, a Preliminary Proposal for a Master Plan for our parish was reviewed by the members. Discussion began for upgrading both the parish hall and the courtyard, since the County Health Department requires a surface to be installed where food is prepared during our annual Greek Festivals. It is work to be performed by February 2018 in time for our Festival. The proposal to upgrade the courtyard includes installing a concrete "patio" area stretching from the annex along the back wall of the courtyard. The width of this concrete area would be about 30 feet, leaving area for an artificial, *Back Nine* grass surface to replace the current lawn.

At the same time, plans are being studied to replace the flooring in the parish hall, with either a tile or carpet surface. As an option (if desired) French doors may also be included.

In accordance with the present time-line of Parish Council meetings held for the purpose of study and bid acceptance, all St. George parish members in good standing are asked to participate in a special General Assembly on Sunday, September 24, 2017. Look for a notification package which is to be sent out containing financial information and a full, comprehensive Parish

Council report pertaining to the church projects.

A full current financial report, including a 5-Year analysis of trend is available in the parish office and/or may be obtained by <u>Members in Good Standing</u> directly from Fr. Ted.

ENDOWMENT FUND REPORT

The Saint George of the Desert Endowment Fund grew from \$312,192.37 at month end June, 2017 to \$316,001.60 at the month end July, 2017.

Our current Asset Allocation follows the Fund's by-laws as shown below:

We began 2017 with a balance of \$288,807.91. The Endowment Fund has shown us that patient investing will get us to our goal of +\$500,000 so we can utilize the funds if necessary and voted upon.

During the month a deposit was made with 28 United Health Group shares as stewardship for a current value of \$5,370 which can be used at any time as an offering to the church with proper authorization of the Parish Council. Current Stock price is \$193.06/share with a 1.54% Dividend. This is included as our account's total value and is not considered part of the Endowment Fund.

Parishioners are always welcome to donate by check to the Endowment Fund through the St. George Parish Office with St George of the Desert Endowment Fund written on the Memo Line of the check. Remember the Church in your estate planning. To date, \$925 has been donated to the fund.

STEWARDSHIP ANNOUNCEMENT

We wish to gratefully thank everyone who has donated to our church in time, talent, and treasure this past year. The time has come to set a minimum Stewardship Level Requirement for our beloved St. George Church in order to maintain the integrity & future of our beautiful church, including meeting our monthly basic financial obligations of operating expenses to keep the church open & viable. In addition, this minimum will be adjusted yearly, to account for the rate of inflation, approximately 2-5% increase.

For 2018, the basic Stewardship Level Minimum will be \$600 per family. (Please note that this will be submitted as a by-law revision to be voted on at an upcoming General Assembly in the Fall.)

Why are we doing this? Most Orthodox Churches have established a minimum stewardship level so we are behind the trend in doing so. Stewardship is supposed to cover the operating expenses of the church. Parishioners need to understand that there is a minimum level the church needs to be able to pay the bills just to keep the doors open. For example, out of the current 110 families who have pledged stewardship this year, 47 families are below the \$600 level. If everyone else above \$600 kept their pledge the same, and the 47 who are below raised their pledge up to at least \$600, the church would gain an additional \$15,000 annually. This is significant given that it takes +\$20,000 to operate the church monthly. Additionally, giving to our church, as directed in the Bible, is supposed to be with love, joy, thankfulness, & gratitude for all that God has given to us. Are we truly expressing that gratitude? "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for God, not for men."

As per our by-laws, any parishioner who feels they are unable to meet this new financial minimum request may discuss their situation with

THE THEME FOR THIS MONTH IS: THE PARAKLISIS SERVICE

GRADES 3-6: Read with your child(ren) the following verses from the Paraklisis Service of our Orthodox Church:

Explain that the Paraklisis Service is a prayer service asking the Most Holy Mother of God to offer Her Motherly prayers for us. This Church Service is performed for the health and well-being of all.

- 1. "With many temptations surrounding me, Searching for salvation, I have hastened unto you; O Mother of the Word, and ever-Virgin. From all distresses and dangers deliver me."
- 2. "Lord, enlighten us, with Your precepts that can guide our lives, and with Your arm most powerful, grant to us Your peace, O You Who are the Friend of all."

Discuss with them the following questions:

What did you read? What stood out to you?

- What does it mean for our lives?
- How does it feel to know that Panagia loves you? Who else loves you?

Lesson: Love is more than a feeling. It's a choice and an action; it's something we live out in real relationships with real live people.

GRADES 7-12: Explain the purpose of the Paraklisis Service as noted above. Then, Discuss the Gospel passage that is read during the Paraklisis Service (St. Luke, Chapter 1: 39-56). Prayer leads to action: "faith without works is dead." Therefore, it is good to consider how people can make the Paraklisis Service offered for the health and wellness of all a cause for ministry to others. Share with your child(ren) some ministries of our Church, encouraging them to learn more so that one day they can volunteer to help.

THE HOLY CROSS OF CHRIST AND THE ROLE OF HELEN, MOTHER OF CONSTANTINE

After the beginning of the Church Year on September 1, a major feast that is observed is that of the discovery of the Holy Cross upon which the Lord Jesus Christ allowed Himself to be sacrificed. One who had the greatest role in this was the mother of the Emperor Constantine. St. Helen had been married to one who had earlier become a Roman Emperor, Constantius Chlorus. By the turn of the Fourth Century, it was becoming clear that it was hard for one man to rule the entire Roman Empire. The Emperor Diocletian, had devised a way for the empire to be ruled by four persons. One of these was Constantius, father of Constantine. But Diocletian wanted control over people who served him and he also wanted to punish Christians. So he asked Constantius to divorce Helen and marry a daughter of Maximian, who was the western Emperor. Constantine also was held at Diocletian's court. But, Constantine escaped and went to his father, who ruled Britain. Meanwhile, St. Helen converted to Christianity, which showed the foolishness of Diocletians' attempt to control his citizens.

When Constantius died in 306 A.D. the army proclaimed Constantine as Emperor. St. Helen was together with her son and became part of his court. She was recognized as Empress. Her attraction to Christ had a big impact on her son, who put Christian symbols on the shields and standards of his troops when he fought Maxentius at the Battle of the Milvian Bridge. At 312 A.D., Constantine issued a decree of toleration for Christians. Finally, Constantine won command of the entire empire by 324 A.D. But, it should be noted that Constantine himself was still not a baptized Christian. He was actually baptized only a few days before his death in 337 A.D.

In the meantime, Helen, with the rank of Empress was sent on a major expedition to the Holy Land to seek relics of the crucifixion and birth

of Christ, with the authority of Constantine. Indeed, there where many discarded crosses in the area of Calvary. A temple to Venus had been put over the Calvary area and this was demolished by the Empress. Under Constantine, a new Church of the Holy Sepulcher was built and church in Bethlehem, as well as other holy places were also established. Many of the crosses were tested by Helen on a sick woman, which revealed the True Cross of Christ. The real Cross also had the lettering described in the Gospel. Some of this message was brought back to Rome by St. Helen.

St. Helen returned to Rome with part of the Holy Cross. She died in 330 A.D., the same year Constantine founded Constantinople. The Emperor Constantine himself died in 337, just after his baptism. We can see that Helen had a huge impact on her son, and through him, on the eastern and western world. When Christians visit the Holy Land, they all follow the footsteps of Helen.

There remain a few other thoughts, which we could probably think about. Many times people look at religion as a "woman's affair," and often we remember the role that a mother had on us. This is true, yet religion is a man's and woman's role *together*. But, we can see the impact that we can all have on our family and our friends, as well as on society. We can all do something that will survive us in our effort to promote our Faith. Think of Sts. Constantine and Helen. Think of what they did for their Church and for civilization. Can we be Constantine and Helen for others in the Church? I pray we truly will!
