UNION WITH GOD

For Orthodox Christians, one of the most pivotal statements in the Bible comes from St. Peter: "Grace and peace be multiyou in plied to knowledge of God and of Jesus our Lord, as His divine power has given to us all things that pertain to life and godliness through the knowledge of Him, who called us by glory and virtue...that through these, you may be partakers of the divine nature..." (2 Peter 1:2-4).

The idea of partaking in the divine nature of Christ God is truly Apostolic, and it describes for us the very purpose of human life. St. Paul expressed this same point, as he wrote, "[Christ] will transform our lowly body that it may be conformed to His glorious body." (Philippians 3:21). Over time, this Apostolic Tradition was (and is) carried on, as St. Basil echoes it in his Divine Liturgy: "Although He is God before all the ages, He appeared on

earth and dwelled among us, being Incarnated of the Holy Virgin...taking the form of a servant, and becoming conformed to the fashion of our lowliness, that He might make us conformable to the image of His glory."

By the early-to-middle 1300s, St. Gregory "ditto" Palamas would Apostolic these words with an analysis, suggesting that, as the sun has its rays, God has His energies (among them, grace and light). By His energies, God creates, sustains, and governs the universe. By His energies, He transforms creation and makes it holy, using creation to serve His Will, filling it with His energies as water fills a sponge. We experience God's love through His divine powers. In this way God sanctifies humanity. It follows that God transforms our nature from that of "the dust of the earth" into that divine likeness.

In the Apostolic "mind," human beings are destined to participate in God's energies even from the time of their earthly soiourn. This is made manifest in the lives of Saints of many the Church. Some examples include:

--St. Peter, through prayer to our Savior, raised Tabitha from the dead. These few examples illustrate how people, through strong faith in God and sincere prayer are given the divine powers of our Savior to do the very same things that He did during His sojourn in our human history.

--Over many years, through sincere, heart-felt prayer in faith, St. Irene, the Abbess of the Monastery of Chrysovalantou, was given the grace of the Holy Spirit receiving the gifts of prophesy and the same power as Christ to cast out demons from the demon-possessed.

of God to heal the blind, just as our Lord did in BISHOP ELPIDOPHOROS OF AMERICA His ministry.

--St. Nicholas of Myra was graced with the | Archbishop, divine gift of calming the sea for seafarers who were facing certain death, calling to mind how Christ calmed the sea for His Apostles.

These few examples illustrate how people, through strong faith in God and sincere prayer are given the divine powers of our Savior to do the very same things that He did during His sojourn in our human history. Our Lord calls each of us to be His co-workers for the salvation of others.

The grace of the Holy Spirit allows for our union with God to the degree of our love for God. In the Divine Liturgy, we are called to "commit ourselves...and our whole life to Christ our God." Fr. Alexander Schmemann says, "'The seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit...[means that] the whole person is now the temple of God and one's life is from now on a <u>liturgy</u>," (For the Life of the World, pg. 92). Our efforts are aimed at strengthening our faith in God so that with God, we can participate in the "everyday" wonders of inspiring our youth; healing broken marriages; overcoming anger and depression, etc., all of which is "liturgy" (in other words: work) for salvation.

In this way, our self-image is no longer based on personal fantasies or the opinions of others. Our self-image is that of the Image of God within us. As the Saints, both male and female, performed wonders to the glory of God, we too are called to share in God's eternal love, which is a constant giving love, and which can only be met with unceasing prayer.

It all begins in the here and now. "Do you not know that you are the temple of God and that the Spirit of God dwells in you?" (1 Thessalonians 3:16). The true identity of every person is that of being a temple of God.

His **Eminence** Elpidophoros (Lambriniadis) of America born in 1967 in Bakirköy, Istanbul, Turkey. He



studied at the Department of Pastoral Theology at the Theological School of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki, graduating in 1991. In 1993, he completed postgraduate studies at the Philosophical School of the University of Bonn in Germany, submitting a dissertation entitled: "The Brothers Nicholas and John Mesarites." He was ordained to the Diaconate in 1994 at the Patriarchal Cathedral and was appointed to the position of Kodikographos (Scrivener) of the Holy and Sacred Synod.

In 1995, he was appointed Deputy Secretary of the Holy and Sacred Synod. From 1996-1997 he studied at the Theological School of St. John the Damascene in Balamand, Lebanon, where he advanced his knowledge of the Arabic language. In 2001, he presented a doctoral dissertation at the Theological School of the Aristotle University of Thessaloniki under the title: "Severus of Antioch and the Council of Chalcedon" and was proclaimed a Doctor of Theology. In 2004, he was invited to Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology in Boston, where he taught as Visiting Professor for a semester.

In March 2005, at the proposal of His All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, he was elevated by the Holy and Sacred Synod to the position of Chief Secretary and ordained to the priesthood by the Ecumenical Patriarch in the Patriarchal Cathedral. In 2009, he submitted two dissertations to the Theological School of Thessaloniki and was unanimously elected Assistant Professor of Symbolics, Inter-Orthodox relations and the Ecumenical Movement. The dissertations

are entitled: "The Synaxes of the Hierarchy of the Ecumenical Throne (1951-2004)" and "Luther's Ninety-five Theses: Historical and Theological Aspects. Text - Translation - Commentary."

In March 2011, he was elected Metropolitan of Bursa and in August of the same year was appointed Abbot of the Holy Patriarchal and Stavropegial Monastery of the Holy Trinity on the island of Halki. He has served as Orthodox Secretary of the Joint International Commission for the Theological Dialogue between the Orthodox Church and the Lutheran World Federation and member of the Patriarchal delegations to the General Assemblies of the Conference of European Churches and the World Council of Churches. He was the Secretary of the Pan-Orthodox Synods in Sofia (1998), Istanbul (2005), Geneva (2006), and Istanbul (2008). He has been a member of the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches since 1996.

We were fortunate to have leftover food from the St. George Golf Outing Saturday dinner, which was designated for our use by George Argyros. Volunteers from our Ladies Philoptochos group prepared the leftovers of lamb chops, green beans, & french fries in special "To Go" containers that were purchased for this purpose. The containers of food and clothing were then transported to the locations and handed out. We served 80 homeless on this outing.

Our thanks to all the volunteers who donated their time and talent with this latest effort.

In the future, our Ladies Philoptochos group will establish a monthly calendar for the rest of the year with the dates planned for outreach. The schedule will be posted very soon and we hope to have many volunteers from our parish to assist us with our homeless outreach efforts for the remainder of the year.

Eternal Light Society

CHURCH & WELLNESS "Thy Will be Done!"

Praying the Lord's Prayer, I often find myself saying the words "Thy Will be done," with a certain emphasis, silently asking God to intervene into a situation, while allowing me to be at peace with the outcome that God ordains. For a "nanosecond" a thought goes through my head, flashing the words of the Serenity Prayer or the slogan of every recovering addict, "Let go and Let God," a seemingly adolescent interpretation of our Lord's words, "Thy Will be done."

I have always wanted to find inner peace at the notion of abandoning my worries and allowing God to take care of everything, "according to His Will." All I ever had to do is simply *surrender* to the Divine Will and all is at peace. Ultimately, this is all true.

However, God's Will often requires our full participation. Here is where our faith in God's Will is tested every day. More often than not, asking for God's Will to be done has required a tax on me which is not necessarily a comfortable thing, strongly tempting me to be even more anxious. I had to learn that asking for God's Will to be done requires from me that <u>I</u> actually <u>do</u> God's Will in all | already has the plan. Many trials come our way aspects of my life. There have been times when I haven't particularly been ready to be a part of it, due to timing in my "busy" schedule; due to my level of energy, due to the fact that I fail to feel the "spunk" to do something needed that I had not previously thought of doing or learning how to do. But, even now, if I want God's Will to be done, I have to - like it or not - become a coworker with God in a very particular manner, often involving very specific, or maybe intricate skills or duties, which often takes me out of my comfort zone, and allow God to work with me work, being the operative, uncomfortable word.

Specifically, about twenty-five years ago "sprained" my ankle playing basketball with youth. As soon as the doctor raised his eyebrows with concern, I thought, "O God, I hope it's just a sprained ankle like I think it is, and not anything more serious. Oh, well, Lord, Thy Will be done!"

Well, it was a hairline fracture. Recovery and healing would require more long-term pain and discomfort. I had hoped that by asking for God's Will to be done, there would be a "quick fix" for me. I was hoping that God's Will was that an instant miracle would be performed so that *I could* keep on doing what I want. Instead, God's Will, like with St. Paul's "thorn in the flesh," would be that I should endure this small pain for longer than *I* wanted. It would become a real cross for me to carry for a while. I wasn't able to drive myself to places that I "had" to be, which really upset my schedule.

Over the years, I often remember my pain and the things it taught me: to try to be patient with other people in their weakness and to never take good health and happiness for granted. In the end, the small cross of an injured ankle was just a taste of the Cross of our Lord which He carries with (and for) each of us in all of our trials. Indeed, no matter how imperfect a situation is, we can always make it worse by giving up the effort to rehabilitate (or repent) -- and, anything can always be worse. Be thankful that it isn't.

It's been said that while people make plans, God that can take us off our game. It's good to be humbled by God and to remain humble before God. That's how we learn to give love. We can choose to accept our trials as opportunities to be co-workers with God, offering salvation to others, as peacemakers and healers of one another's soul. Ultimately, we need to take seriously the words of St. John Cassian: "The Will of God is that all people should be saved, according to the saying of the blessed Paul, and come to the knowledge of the Truth." (Selected Writing of St. John Cassian the Roman, ed. by St. Paisios Orthodox Women's Monastery, pg. 29).

Be assured that asking for God's Will to be done will require us to humbly become part of the relentless, day-to-day drama that comes as God's Will unfolds.

"If we ask something from God without making any sacrifice, it has no value. If I sit and say, 'God, please heal this person.' without making some sacrifice, it's as though I'm just uttering good words." — Saint Paisios of Mount Athos

When have we ever achieved something in this world without some effort or sacrifice? This is the practice arena for our spiritual life. Everything from God is a gift, in our asking for a "gift" from God, we have to have the correct state of mind. Which is aligning our will with His will. To that end we must sacrifice at some level to make our will subservient. " Lord, Heal this person!" ...we might ask. Is it because we are just superficially being nice, or have we taken the time to care for the person, put our interests aside over the person we are praying for, through caring for them either directly or indirectly, taking time away from entertaining pursuits, financially, time spent etc. Many times we get discouraged when we ask and have sacrificed, but have not taken the final step, surrendering our will to God's will. This is when we become outcome independent but completely at peace, knowing that God's will is best no matter the outcome.

Doing God's will involves charity.



Interesting comment about the attitude of service and giving. A good friend reminded me that we should **not** give until it "hurts" rather, we should give until it "feels good". That idea of feeling good is the realization that we are doing it for our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and that external good works do not suppress arrogance but often increase it. Rather the road to true charity is through prayer and a realization of God's creation, repent-

ance and realization of our sin through Holy Confession (contrition), and finally understanding that whatever we give has already been given to us by God in one way or another.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

The members of our Parish Council met on Tuesday, May 7, 2019. The meeting's highlights included:



- There was agreement that the St. George Golf
 Tournament was very successful and much
 appreciation was expressed for the efforts of
 George Argyros, who served as our Gold
 Tournament Chairman.
- Analysis of this year's St. George Greek Festival included concerns for quick service to patrons attending the Festival, in order to keep the crowd moving so that long lines do not keep forming. Discussion also included the probabilities involving expanding the annex in order to install walk-in refrigeration and freezing for food storage.
- A decision was made to upgrade the regular office computer in order to provide for up-todate programs.
- Linda Kallis gave a report indicating preparations needed to begin renting our parish hall and/or our parish courtyard to non-parishioners for various social gatherings. Efforts will be made to prepare the parish hall and courtyard for advertising purposes.
- Security concerns were addressed in light of efforts to begin renting the parish hall and courtyard for various non-parish affairs. Discussion centered on placing security cameras in the church proper; the parking lot; the courtyard and the parish hall.
- Fr. Ted announced that the new mosaic icons will be delivered on May 15th. Installation will take place from May 15th to May 25th. The icons will be installed on the North and South walls of the church temple. The icons are: The Transfiguration of Christ; Pentecost; The Annunciation, and The Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

THE ASCENSION OF CHRIST: COMPLETING JESUS' HUMAN ROLE & PREPARING FOR THE HOLY SPIRIT

The Ascension of Christ will be celebrated on June 6th. His Ascension marks the fulfillment of His role and ministry as our Savior. The period of 40 days after His Resurrection from the dead is one in which He appears to His disciples in different ways which stress His divinity. We are given the vision of His real glory as God, arisen from the dead.

The Gospel of St. Luke gives the most outstanding example of Christ's last ministry to His disciples and a dramatic account of the Ascension, at which time He gave His final charge and blessing: "...And lifting His hands He blessed them. While blessing them, He parted from them as was carried up into heaven. And they returned to Jerusalem with great joy." (St. Luke 24: 21-52). In the Book of Acts, St. Luke serves as the great historian of the Church, showing believers the true meaning of the Early Church: "To them He presented Himself alive after His Passion by many proofs, appearing to them during forty days, and speaking of the Kingdom of God." (Acts 1:3).

Not all sources are from St. Luke or from the Acts of the Apostles. St. Mark outlines the Ascension in Chapter 16, verse 19. St. Matthew also describes Christ's post-Resurrection ministry in Chapter 18, verses 17-20. In his First Epistle to the Corinthians, St. Paul explains one of the appearances of the Risen Christ: "Then He appeared to more than five thousand brethren at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep." (1 Corinthians 15: 6-8).

Particularly in the Gospel of St. Matthew we are given the two statements of our Lord that deal with the salvation of humanity into the future. First, our Lord commanded His disciples, as they met Him on the mountain to which He had directed them, saying, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded

you." These words are known as the "Great Commission," which is the purpose of the Church in the world. Second, our Lord added His promise to be with them (and their followers) with these words: "Behold, I am with you always, to the close of the age."

Most certainly there is the future. Only ten days following our Savior's Ascension, the Holy Spirit descended upon the Holy Apostles on the Day of Pentecost. The Feast of Pentecost will be celebrated by Orthodox Christians this year on Sunday, June 16th. It is important to note that the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father, just as the Son is eternally begotten from the Father. From now on, the ministry of Christ is through the Holy Spirit. Christ has not left. His ministry to the world is with us through the Holy Spirit.

In a real sense, our destiny is a new ministry - a new work among us. The work of redemption has been done. Now, the future of the Church is through the Holy Spirit. Thus, the Ascension of Christ shows us the mystery of our own relationship to the Church.

On the Sunday that follows the celebration of Christ's Ascension, and before Pentecost, we commemorate the Holy Fathers and Saints who convened at the First Ecumenical Council. This is the Council that formulated the Nicene Creed in which we confess that our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ is both human and divine. Though His humanity, we partake in His divine energies. This is as true for us as individuals as it is for all of us collectively as His Church.

May we be received into His completed work and the Heavenly Church!


