> Unfortunately, those who advocate for freedom of choice conveniently forget that human life begins in the womb at the time of conception. The *choice* that

one is free to make is not whether life exists in the womb, but whether or not to seek Holy Marriage as the sacred context in which sexual love is to be expressed. Indeed, to try to debate that human life does not begin at conception in the womb is to deny reality itself.

Babes in the womb do comprehend life. This is not only borne out by many who suggest that they can experience certain basic emotions in the womb such as "peace" or "anxiety," but it is proven by the Gospel passage that is read in the Orthodox Church when the Annunciation of the Virgin Mary is celebrated on March 25th.

#### **GREAT LENT: LOVE AND SACRIFICE**

We all know that Easter—the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ—is the center and reality of Christ and our salvation. The impact of Easter is so great that I recall several people who were so inspired by the Resurrection Service, including myself, that, in time, they converted to the Eastern Orthodox Faith. In fact, the Resurrection Service is powerful enough to convert even one's thoughts to Orthodox spirituality. With me, it took a couple of years. For another, it took only six months.

The beginning of the Triodion Season shifts our thoughts to repentance and inner change. With "Forgiveness Sunday," March 14th this year, repentance is placed before us as the chief of things to do to change our lives. The day after "Forgiveness Sunday" is "Clean Monday," when Great Lent actually begins, as we each do our best to maintain the Lenten fasting regimen.

The first Sunday of Great Lent is the "Sunday of Orthodoxy" on March 21st with the message that icons are images of passages from the Bible and the events in the lives of our Lord and the Saints. As tools for prayer, icons are to be venerated in the same way that we venerate the Bible and the Holy Cross.

The Sunday following the "Sunday of Orthodoxy" is dedicated to the commemoration of **St. Gregory Palamas, on March 28th**, who pointed out to us the mystical theology of the Church. He is one of the greatest theologians of the Orthodox Church and championed the practice of unceasing prayer by calling upon the Name of Jesus.

We know in Lent that Christ gave His life for all of us. What do we do? Lent is the time and season for sacrifices in love through our spiritual life in Jesus Christ. Lent is the time for us to make our sacrifices for the glory of our Lord May the Lord's great sacrifice for all of us be repeated and made real in our own lives.

#### SPIRITUAL THOUGHTS

"In the mercy of God, the little thing done with humility will enable us to be found in the same

place as the saints who have labored much and have been true servants of God."...+St. Dorotheos of Gaza

Salvation is not measured in amounts or volumes of accomplishments. It is above all a direct result of a humility in every little thing we do. It is a lack of criticism; it is a concern for feelings and the wounds of others; it is seeing ourselves as no different than anyone else, in that we are all at the mercy of God. Humility is the leaven that rises the bread that is our salvation. It opens the door for Christ to enter our hearts, it allows the Holy Spirit to operate in our lives and gives us grace. Humility is soil of our hearts that allows works to bloom which glorify God. We must not look to what we did or accomplished, rather we need to look at the attitude we had when God used us to accomplish any good thing. If we think it is us, we act in vain. If we open the door for humility we become instruments of the Creator of the Universe, being filled with His love.

The Publican cried "Lord have mercy" and the Prodigal "I have sinned." If we are aware of our daily spiritual state, this is all we can say. Together it is the ultimate prayer of repentance...the Jesus Prayer, or the prayer of the heart. "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner."

Repeated over and over again by monastics, it becomes a prayer that burns into a person's heart and transforms one into a constant state of repentance. If we can say this simple prayer during our day, every day, at every obstacle we face, with every sin we fall into, at every temptation that pokes at us, and with every encounter we have with those around us who also are suffer-

ing, then our hearts can be transformed as well. This prayer brings us to mind the Publican and the Prodigal who along with the thief on the cross cried to the Lord for mercy. This rule of prayer can sustain us daily and keep us under the grace of the living God. Let us enter this Lenten period with an effort to kindle our desire for God, and make this prayer part of our subconscious so we live in a constant state of repentance.

#### PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The Parish Council met on Thursday, February 11, 2021 to discuss the following matters:



- 1. Stewardship as of January 31, 2021 was at \$70,940 pledges from 53 members, with \$13,160 received. An updated report will be presented at the Spring General Assembly Meeting on March 14, 2021.
- This month, the Parish Council applied for and received the monies of the government stimulus program (approximately \$18,400) which helps considerably in light of the cancellation of this year's Greek Festival.
- **3.** As of February 9, 2021, the St. George Endowment Fund had \$432,365. A complete treasurer's report was mailed out to our parish members on Thursday, February 25th in preparation for the Spring General Assembly Meeting.
- The Parish Council gave a down-payment to reserve the Desert Willow Golf Resort in Palm Desert for our St. George Golf Tournament, which will be held on September 25, **2021.** Everyone is asked to save the date.
- 5. Report was given that the **Metropolis Clergy-**Laity Conference will take place on Friday and Saturday, April 16-17, 2021 in a "Zoom" (Virtual) format. Registration deadline for Parish Council delegates is Monday, April 5, 2021.

Throughout the year, and especially during Great Lent (beginning on March 15th) our Church addresses the Most Holy Theotokos, asking Her to pray for us. In doing so, we come to understand Her role in our life and, through Her example, our role in each other's lives.

Intercessory Prayer is one's personal prayer for other people. Praying for others is critical to our ability to forgive one another; to empathize with one another, and to offer needed spiritual and practical help to one another.

This, in turn, provides us with purpose and meaning in life and it helps us to remain faithful to Christ-like virtues through which we become better people, and maybe even saints of God. It's been said before that the picture of excellent mental and spiritual health is an icon of a saint of our Church, each one of whom prayed for others.

As we read this enclosed prayer to the Theotokos, let us say these words as coming from within our own hearts, while inscribing in our minds the names of those who have hurt us and of those who love us. Let us pray for their salvation as we pray for our own. We will find that our prayers for them, will be answered as will be their prayers for us, through the intercession of the Chief of all Saints, the Most Holy Theotokos. +FR. THEODORE

#### PHILOPTOCHOS NEWS

Our St. George Ladies Philoptochos Chapter expresses gratitude for all who donated funds and food toward the success of their "Feeding the Hungry Food Drive," which was held from February 21st to February 28th. Our Philoptochos received 185 pounds of food that was delivered to "The Narrow Door" along with more food that was purchased from generous cash donations from several other parishioners. Food gathered through this effort was delivered on Tuesday, February 23rd by Rhonda Latkovic, Debbie Pausen, and Margarita goulatos. Since the pandemic began March, St. George Philoptochos donated a total of 4,500 pounds of food for the hungry! This
