#### THE PRESENTATION OF CHILDREN IN THE CHURCH

Presenting our new-born children to ple of the Law by Mary, Your Ever-Christ our God through the Forty-Day Blessing Service in Church is the beginning of educating them in accordance with our Holy Orthodox Christian Faith. Educating our children in the Faith is a three-fold effort: 1) setting the example of Orthodox spiritual life; 2) explaining the Holy Tradition of our Church through family discussions; 3) bringing our children to Sunday Church Services and Sunday School consistently.

As is true for each of us, our children are also the people of God, "temples of the Holy Spirit," as St. Paul stated in his Epistles. As such, we are both inheritors of all God's many blessings and conveyors of God's many blessings -- or, as is so often said, "coworkers" with God.

On February 2nd every year, we celebrate the Presentation of Christ into the Temple. As our Savior, Christ is also our Law-Giver, He subjected Himself to the Law. The purpose of God's Law is, 1) to draw us closer to God's grace, and, 2) to convey to all the Divine Love.

Taking from the example of Christ our God, Who was presented into the Temple, we present our children into our Church by way of the Forty-Day Blessing Service, through which we pray: "Lord God, on the fortieth day You were brought as an infant into the Tem-

Virgin and Holy Mother and held in the arms of the righteous Symeon. Will You, as Sovereign Lord, also bless this infant brought here to be presented to You the Author of all...advance it in every good work pleasing to You, and by the signing with the mark of the Cross, will You put to flight every opposing force..."

Let us pray that we ourselves do not unwittingly become the "opposing force" with regard to all that benefit our children by neglecting our responsibilities to follow the teachings of our Church. Saints have said that the greatest fear of all is, not fear of catastrophes, or of illness, but of committing sins, because sin corrupts both us and the next generation.

Dr. John Boorjamra, in his book, Foundations for Christian Education, tells us, "A child discovers what it is to be a Christian by being told what it means, but primarily by experiencing the reality of the living community, whether parish or family." (pg. 94). Hence, we have a tremendous responsibility to do all we can to maintain a Sunday School program and to bring our children to Church Services and Sunday School. By comprehending the meaning of Holy Orthodoxy for their lives, children can grow into truly faithful and great servants of God -- becoming saints, if we allow it.

## SPIRITUAL THOUGHTS by Deacon Euthym

"A tree is known by its fruit; a man by his deeds. A good deed is never lost; he who sows courtesy reaps friendship, and he who plants kindness gathers love." - Saint Basil

"Be ashamed when you sin, don't be ashamed when you repent [To repent means to have a change of heart and mind. It is not simply a feeling of sorrow ,but a psycho/spiritual growth away from evil/death and a turning to God/life]. Sin is the wound, repentance is the medicine. Sin is followed by shame; repentance is followed by boldness [Boldness means to beg God for undeserved mercy]. Satan has overturned this order and given boldness to sin and shame to repentance." - Saint John Chrysostom

"What He was, He laid aside; what He was not, He assumed. He takes upon Himself the poverty of my flesh so that I may receive the riches of His divinity." - St. Gregory of Nazianzus

Here we experience the wisdom of the three hierarchs of the church, Sts Basil the Great, Gregory the Theologian and John Chrysostom whose Synaxis we commemorated on Monday, January 30th. Let us always commemorate these three legends of the faith and heed their beautiful words.

"You don't become holy by fighting evil. Let evil be. Look towards Christ and that will save you. What makes a person saintly is love." - St. Porphyrios

This saying of a modern saint reminds us to avoid focusing on the failings of others, of trying to make the world and others "perfect". Rather he tells us to look towards Christ to receive His grace so we can truly love others, ourselves and remove judgement from our life. The only way to "fight evil" is through love and sincere repentance when we fall. Love's essence is rooted in humility. Humility comes from living a confessional life.

"Prayer is the flower of gentleness and of freedom from anger" - Evagrios the Solitary

I don't think we realize how great an opportunity we have to find peace and freedom from

worldly worries and cares in daily prayer. When we leave everything at the feet of our Lord and ask for His grace in all humility, the Holy Spirit comes to us as the Comforter, the Spirit of Truth, Treasury of Good things and Giver of life. We invoke these words in the Trisagion prayers. Let us not look at prayer as a task, but as a necessary relationship with the Source of life and of all good things, a place where we can put away any facades and encounter the Living God.

"The Lord did not come to make a display. He came to heal and to teach suffering men. For one who wanted to make a display the thing would have been just to appear and dazzle the beholders. But for Him Who came to heal and to teach the way was not merely to dwell here, but to put Himself at the disposal of those who needed Him, and to be manifested according as they could bear it, not vitiating the value of the Divine appearing by exceeding their capacity to receive it."— St. Athanasius the Great

We too should imitate Christ in this way. Not make a display in our lives, but to reach out and heal those who suffer. How do we do that? Give what our neighbor can receive and give what is needed for healing, both of body, mind and most importantly of soul. Do not give more than the capacity of the receiver to receive it. In this way we slowly bring people closer to the Lord, not by judging, but by reaching out to those areas in which they are suffering, and to apply the poultice of love as much as they can stand.

"It sometimes happens that a person in despondency thinks to himself that it would be easier for him to be destroyed, or to be without any feeling and consciousness, than to remain any longer in this unaccountably tormenting state of mind. One should try to get out of it as quickly as possible. Beware of the spirit of despondency, for it gives birth to every evil." - St. Seraphim of Sarov

Despondency might be the most vicious tool of the devil. It breeds a lack of hope which can lead to despair. It creates a "what difference does it make" attitude and breeds an apathy that has no love. A way to "get out of it as

possible" as St Seraphim suggests, is through to pathways, internal and external. Internally be quieting the mind and reaching out to God, in thanks, glorifying Him for whatever blessings we can think of past and present. Externally by getting busy helping and reaching out to others so as to take our mind off of our own situation, no matter how bad, and allowing our internal dialogue to take a rest. The devil would like nothing more to delude us that there is no . hope. But with God all things are possible and there is always hope. In Scripture the word "hope" is accompanied by patience almost 80% of the time. So let us patiently endure whatever we encounter and combat the spirit of despondency by giving God glory even in the darkest moments and helping and reaching out to others in love.

- Upcoming Greek Festival Meeting: Monday, February 6th at our parish hall at 4:00 p.m.
- "Cashlessness": Almost all of this year's Festival stations will be operating solely on a credit-card basis. Credit card purchases will be processed through the newly installed Clover Credit Card Processing System, through which transactions will be electronically recorded and reported between patrons' accounts and our parish accounts. Chairpersons of Festival stations are invited to learn more about the Clover system by way of a tutorial offered by our parish treasurer, Nick Latkovic.
- Volunteers: St. George volunteers are the best! Despite their back-braking sacrifices of time and talent, our parish volunteers have kept pace with Festival food preparations throughout January. Through it all, it has been fun! More pleasant memories of fellowship have been created. The next two and a half weeks will require the same heroic effort of love as we draw near to "Festival time."
- **Underwriting:** Not everyone can physically perform the laborious tasks that are

required for the success of the Festival. For those who would like to be a part of our winning team, **donating toward the costs** associated with our Festival is a huge help. For those who cannot physically work at a Festival station, a donation of \$100 will help pay a worker to work a complete half-day shift (5 hours). We will honor our volunteers and underwriters in a special manner in the near future.

- Schedule: The next two weeks are very important. Anyone who has yet to volunteer to help in Festival preparations is asked to come forward; for, the work has fallen to some of the same people who always get things done for our parish. However, relief for them would be a "double blessing," because, not only would new volunteers be able to make sure production is maintained at its current high standard, but those who can volunteer now will help in providing needed rest to those already volunteering, thereby allowing them to maintain their good health.
- Flyers: Festival flyers are available in our parish hall and they are ready for distribution throughout neighborhoods and among businesses. Distribution of flyers to hotels during the week just prior to the Festival will be key to our general success!

# RESUMING MONTHLY BLESSING OF THE WATERS SERVICES ("AGIASMO")

For a few years now - and particularly prior to the Covid-19 outbreak - we have performed the Blessing of the Waters Service (the "Agiasmo" Service) on one Sunday every month.

On Sunday, February 12, 2023 we will resume this tradition of our St. George parish, because this Sunday of February 12th marks one week before our first St. George Greek Festival in three years, due to the Covid-19 outbreak. This year, we will commemorate the 25th anniversary of our on-going Greek Festivals since the construction of our St. George church edifice.

This first "Agiasmo" Service will also present an opportunity for our Sunday School students to learn about the meaning of this Holy Church prayer service and why we bless our homes. Fr. Ted will lead the lesson.

The "Agiasmo" Service, together with the les-

son, will take place in the church shortly after coffee is served for our coffee hour in the parish hall. Everyone is invited to return to the church in order to participate in this Holy Church Service, which will begin at approximately 11:15 a.m.

Beginning in March the monthly "Agiasmo" Service schedule over the next few months (due to Great Lent, Pascha and Pentecost) will be: Sunday, March 12th; Sunday, April 2nd; Sunday, May 7th; Sunday, June 11th. Holy Water will be available for all parishioners to take home following the Church Services.

The good news is we are expecting +6,000 visitors at our Festival on February 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> with good weather. This will amount to over 18,000 transactions at our booths.

The 2023 St George Festival will accept Credit / Debit Cards only for payment to improve transactional efficiency, eliminate manual bookkeeping and reduce the security concerns related to handling large amounts of cash.

We are using CLOVER Electronic Registers to process all transactions. These registers are like today's smartphones – ICON driven and intuitive after a short training session. I highly recommend Chairman and Cashiers attend at least 1 Hands On class to be comfortable with the new machines. See or contact Nick Latkovic with questions.

As with any new technology, there will be questions during the festival. We will have a roaming "Help Desk" team to assist cashiers with questions during the hours of operation.
