DO WE UNDERMINE THE PURPOSE OF HOLY BAPTISM?

Inside this issue

On January 6th, we will celebrate the Baptism of our Lord God and Savior Jesus Christ in the River Jordan by St. John the Baptist. In this event, our Savior puts each of us on His shoulders and buries our fallen human nature, damaged by sins and we are truly born again. This is why the Sacrament of Holy Baptism is performed by immersion in water -- it is a burial of ourselves in the earth (in water) so that we can be joined in Christ's Resurrection to Eternal Life. Hence, we chant the words of St. Paul at the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, *"Those who have been baptized unto Christ have put on Christ."*

As such, our lives are lives of worship to Christ our God. Everything we do is to be an act of worship. Thus, the entire cycle of our Divine Church Services is meant to strengthen, our efforts to worship God, giving God glory in all we say and do. We are reminded of our pledge to fight against selfishness and the temptations for self-aggrandizement so that we can give glory to God by exemplifying His love for all people. This is worship of God and is, what St. Paul called, *"fighting the good fight."* (1 Tim. 6:12)

The Church Herself is an excellent support system for one who truly wants to live a spiritual life dedicated to Christ's glory. On a grand scale, there are clergy, theologians, as well as the Divine Church Services themselves from which

one can find guidance. On a smaller scale, there is the family, which includes sponsors and Godparents to help nurture the newly baptized in living the moral and ethical life according to God's love. Even from Apostolic times, entire households were baptized, as noted in St. Paul's First Epistle to the Corinthians (1 Cor. 1:16).

We are tempted into thinking that the Holy Tradition of our Church is "old fashioned" and that Baptism and Marriage are only ceremonies and social events. As Sacraments, however, clergy, (including myself as your priest) family, and sponsors would do well to always improve our way of being examples in showing how the Sacraments of the Church are to be lived.

In particular, baptizing the children on the basis of their innocence alone, while members of our households in general live lives that are at odds with the teachings and worship of our Church, undermines in large part the very purpose of the Sacrament. I shutter when I call to mind, as an extreme example, the scene from the movie *The Godfather* in which a baby is being baptized at the same hour when the baby's "relatives" are literally killing other people. Being washed of Original Sin, the child is destined to be living in a den of sins, calling into question the very purpose for baptizing

the child in the first place.

Going forward, let us join together as a community of Greek Orthodox Christians in the efforts to maintain a spiritual bond with those who have been newly baptized, as well as with their parents and Godparents. Let parents and Godparents commit themselves to learning the teachings of our Church and to live accordingly, as we participate with all of our hearts in the Divine Liturgy every Sunday. Let us also support the efforts of our Sunday School.

**REFLECTION FROM
METROPOLITAN GERASIMOS FOR THE
NATIVITY OF CHRIST**

Brothers and Sisters in the Lord,

For many years, at Christmas time, I would annually attend a performance of Handel's "Messiah." Of course, there are many wonderful parts to the oratorio. Everyone loves hearing the rousing Hallelujah chorus. But a highlight of the performance for me was always the moment when the soprano would sing, "And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying," then the full chorus would respond, "Glory to God in the highest, and peace on earth, good will toward men!"

These words from Scripture (Luke 2:13-14), contained in the story of the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, have found their way into our contemporary cultural landscape, appearing in many ways, from Christmas cards to ornaments, as decorations. Amid the festivities of the season, the profound words "peace on earth," can easily slip by and dare I say, have even become a cliché of the season.

"Peace on earth." So simple, yet so profound. Looking at the state of our world, we long for peace. We see wars. We see inequality, injustice, and oppression. We see civic discord. We see polarization and division among people, perhaps even among our friends and families.

As Orthodox Christians, we know the source of peace. Saint Paul wrote to the Ephesians, "Christ is our peace, who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility." (Ephesians 2:14). Our Christmas celebrations should remind us of this. For Christ is born on this day. Who is this child? The prophet Isaiah described it well, "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government will be upon his shoulder, and his name will be called 'Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.'" (Isaiah 9:6).

We also must recognize that Christ's nativity did not miraculously end hostilities among people. Humanity seems to prefer conflict over harmony and cooperation. Peacemaking, living in peace, is far harder it seems, because it requires daily commitment. Peacemaking and living in peace requires trust, and requires building understanding among people.

Peace on earth begins with inner peace. We open our prayers to God proclaiming, "In peace let us pray to the Lord" because we must approach the Almighty God with open hands of prayer, not the clenched fists of anger. As an old song from the 1950's says, "Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me." There is wisdom in those words. If we are at war internally, if we are angry internally, we cannot be peacemakers. We must do the internal work of digging into our souls to rid ourselves of the enmity and anger that prevents us from forgiving ourselves, forgiving our neighbor, and learning to live in peace and goodwill with all. As the Lord says in the Beatitudes, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God." (Matthew 5:9).

The Christmas holidays are beautiful days, filled with joy. We decorate our homes. We cook. We exchange gifts. We do things to celebrate the birth of Christ and to share the Good News that the Prince of Peace is born. By doing these things the Prince of Peace is born. By doing these things now, we are not just remembering something from two millennia ago, we are saying that the Prince of Peace is born "on this day," for us,

for our times, for our world. Let us open our hearts to the message of the angels to the shepherds, "peace on earth and good will toward men," and commit ourselves to become peacemakers all these days and all the days to come, because there is so much to do!

May the Lord, God, the Newborn King, be always with you and your families, my beloved brothers and sisters in the Lord.

Thus it happened that two opposite marvels took place at once: the death of all was consummated in the Lord's body; yet, because the Word was in it, death and corruption were in the same act utterly abolished. (Athanasius of Alexandria)

He measures all by comparison with His own suffering, so that He may know our condition by His own, and how much is demanded of us, and how much we yield. (Gregory Nazianzen)

Let us read these and contemplate them over the next 4 days as we experience the feast of the Nativity and Baptism of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Christ took our flesh so that we could have the possibility of being clothed in His divinity and have a relationship with Him for eternity. The I AM, Creator of the universe, condescends to take our flesh as an infant born in the most humble circumstances, a cave designed to house the animals. From here salvation comes to the world. Think about this the next time you feel hopeless...Christ saves in the most unexpected circumstance. Our salvation comes through the most unexpected manners.

If we do not prepare ourselves for eternity by correcting our characters, we will not be able to enter the company of the angels and saints. Then we will pass into eternity with all these faults

and sins....Elder Thaddeus

Consider it like putting on a nice outfit for a wedding. We dress up. In turn, we need to dress up our characters for entry into paradise. We want to present ourselves... "without spot or wrinkle" to our Lord. Often we push back against character improvement. Out of pride, laziness, embarrassment or a number of other obstacles. Let us let down our guard and really look at who we are and how we can "do better". The new year is a perfect time to reassess. To invite Christ into the cave of our hearts and place our faults and sins with Him so we can be renewed through His baptism at Holy Theophany.

RE: 2023 Festival Sales using CLOVER™ Registers

The 2023 St. George Festival will use Credit and Debit Cards only for all transactions. We will not be accepting cash at our booths. All transactions will be done on a CLOVER™ device designed for credit card Festival use.

You can see the devices in the Church Hall on the table next to the Sunday School Rooms.

Sales and Transactions are immediately recorded to the correct account eliminating the need for Office Staff, Runners, and Night Cash Deposits during the Festival. Without cash on the premises, risk of robbery and theft is eliminated, and accounting accuracy is greatly improved.

Festivals using this method have seen dramatic increases in sales as the customer is not limited to the cash they have on hand. In addition, there will be a "TIP" screen at food and bar locations which has been proven to increase sales as well.

Chairman and Register workers will need to attend a brief "hands on" training session lasting less than 30 minutes during January and early February. The stations are very intuitive with ICONS and Menu Items already pre-loaded onto the screens. The station operation is very similar to your Smart Phone.

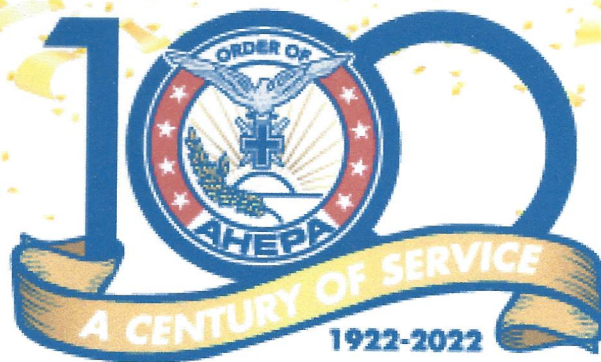
The training schedule will be posted in the 1st issue of the 2023 Ladder. A single session should be sufficient however users are welcome to attend more than 1 for additional training.

During the Festival, we will have on-site support people available for questions from open to close.

The registers can track **SALES, VOID transactions,** and provide **REFUNDS** in real time.
