THE MYSTERY OF GOD'S LOVE

Egotism is based on the idea that we have no need of God and, consequently, we are "gods." Herod characterizes the spirit of self-centeredness by which we fight with God rather than dedicating ourselves to the work of doing God's Will.

Spiritual life is defined as the effort to control our own desires and, instead, to do God's Will. To do God's work, egotism must disappear and humility needs to emerge.

Through humility every set-back in life is turned into a blessing, once we rely on the humility and love of God. We can observe this in the fact as we ponder the event of the Nativity of Christ our God in that He was born in a simple manger. Yet, this simple manger had become Paradise through the very presence of Christ. In the face of this reality every our homes become "Paradise" for each of us. Herod, however, made his whole kingdom "hell" due to his rejection

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ST. STEPHEN THE FIRST MARTYR

While disputing with the Pharisees concerning Jesus, and wisely refuting their every contradiction, so that no one was able to withstand the wisdom and the spirit of his speech, St. Stephen was slandered as a blasphemer and was dragged off to the Sanhedrin of the elders. Then, he proved from the divine Scriptures the coming of the Just One (Jesus), of Whom they had become the betrayers and murderers. As a result, they sentenced him to be stoned to death, accusing him of blasphemy. Among those who assisted in the stoning of St. Stephen was Saul, who, after encountering the Risen Christ in a tremendous vision, became the Apostle St. Paul.

As St. Stephen was dying as a martyr for Christ, he gazed into Heaven and, beholding the divine glory, he said: "Lo, I see the Heavens opened and the Son of man standing at the right hand of God ... Lord Jesus, receive my spirit."

Then, imitating the long-suffering of the Master, he bent his knees and prayed in a loud voice for them that were stoning him, and he said, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge." And saying this, he fell asleep (Acts 6, 7), thus becoming the first among the Martyrs of the Church of Christ.

Δια της ταπεινοφροσυνης το καθε ατυχο γινεται ευλογια, διοτι βασιζομεθα στην χαριν και την αγαπην του Θεου. Παρατηρουμεν αυτο καθως μελετουμεν την Γεννησιν του Θεου μας Χριστου – αφου εγεννηθηκε σε μια απλη φατνην. Αλλα η φατνη εγινε Παραδεισος δια της παρουσιας του Χριστου. Κατα αυτην την πραγματικοτηταν, ακομη τα σπιτια μας μπορούν να ειναι <παραδεισος> για τον καθε ανθρωπον. Ο εγωιστης ο Ηρωδης εκανε την βασιλειαν του <κολαση> επιδη δεν ηθελε τον Θεον σαν εναν <ψευτο-θεο> ηθελε να γινη μονον την δικη του θελησην.

Οταν εχομεν τον Χριστον μεσα στην ψυχην μας και στις σκεψεις μας, ζουμεν οπως μας εδιδαξε ο Χριστος κατα σαρκαν. Προσωποιουνται στην πραγματικοτηταν η ταπεινωσις και η αγαπη – τα δωρα του Θεου. Ο Επισκοπος Καλλιστος Ware λεγει: <Ο Ιησους Χριστος ηνωσε τον ανθρωπον με τον Θεον δια της Ενσαρκωσεως και ανοιξε για τον καθεναν την οδον προς την προσωπικην ενωσιν του με τον Θεον.> +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

of God; as a "false-god," he wanted only his own will to be done.

When we have Christ in our souls and thoughts, we live as Christ taught us when He appeared in the flesh. Humility and love are personified in reality. These are God's gifts to us. Bishop Kallistos Ware said, "Jesus Christ united humanity with God by way of His Incarnation and opened the way for each person's unity with God." (The Orthodox Church, pg. 225).

When we speak of Paradise as Orthodox Christians, we are not speaking of some place "up in the sky," as some would think. Nor is Paradise an "ideal earth," where everybody lounges around in eternal luxury. More so, Paradise is a reality both "in heaven as on earth," as we pray in the Lord's Prayer. It is a *state of being* with God. While God's Kingdom is beyond this material world, it includes this present life, as well. Hence, wherever Christ is, that is where God's Kingdom exists. When Christ is in our lives, everything around us turns into a taste of eternal life with Him. This is the meaning behind the reason for consecrating our church edifices; blessing our homes; participating in the Holy Sacraments. This "heaven on earth" begins with the manger in which Christ our God was born and continues into our lives today.

In this regard, the *Proskomide* (i.e., the Service of Preparing the Holy Gifts) that is conducted during the Orthros prior to the Divine Liturgy references the Nativity of Christ. As the priest covers the Chalice and Paten, he recalls in prayer: "And a star come over the place where the Young Child was with His Mother." This "star" covers the Paten on which particles of the bread (which will be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ) are placed—each particle representing the name of the parishioners of the parish and their loved ones—in other words, the whole Church—His Kingdom.

<u>Hymn for the Sunday After Christmas</u>: Ee Ghenisis sou Christe o Theos... (Your nativity, O Christ our God, has caused the light of knowledge to rise upon the world. For therein the worshippers of the stars were by a star instructed to worship You, the Sun of Righteousness, and to know You as Orient from on high. Glory to You, O Lord.)

<u>Hymn in honor of St. Joseph.</u>: Evangelizou Iosif to Thavid...(Annunciate the miracles to David the ancestor of God, O Joseph. You saw the Virgin pregnant. You glorified with the shepherds. You worshipped with the Magi. And you were warned by an Angel. Entreat Christ God to save our souls.)

<u>Hymn for St. Stephen the First Martyr</u>: Vasileion Diadima estefthi si korifi...(O Stephen, a crown of royalty was laid on your head * for contests you courageously endured for Christ our God, * as first among Martyr saints. * You stood in accusation of the raging Judeans; * and you saw your Savior at the right hand of the Father. * We pray that you will ever entreat Him to save our souls.)

<u>Hymn to St. George</u>: Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis... ("As the one who sets the captives free and the protector of the poor; as physician to the sick and the champion defender of kings, bearer of trophies are you, O Great Martyr George, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.")

<u>Kontakion Hymn for this Sunday</u>: Ee Parthenos simeron...(On this day the Virgin Maid goes to the cave to give birth to the Pre-eternal Word in an ineffable manner. Dance for joy all the inhabited earth as you hear of this. Glorify along with the Angels and the shepherds Him Who willed that He appear as a newborn Child, the Pre-eternal God.)
