OUR SACRIFICE TO GOD

Sin is to the soul what leprosy is to the body. As Christ our God cured the ten lepers from their physical ailment, He heals our souls from spiritual ailments.

Sin is like a virus. As a virus enters our physical environment and ushers an entire array of maladies, in the same way sin enters our spiritual system to cause a multitude of spiritual anomalies. For example, a lack of faith in God gives rise to anxiety; gluttony comes to greed; falsehood leads to foolishness, and so

on. It is for this reason that many people suffer from depression. However, the real cure for depression is gratitude towards God.

As we study today's Gospel passage we note that the nine lepers who were cured by Christ not only did not approach our Lord to glorify Him as True God, but they became entirely lost. In as much as we may be lost as a society we are a depressed, despairing people, in general and, rather than turning to

ST. ANTHONY THE GREAT—Saint Anthony began his ascetic life outside his village of Coma in Upper Egypt, studying the ways of the ascetics and holy men there, and perfecting himself in the virtues of each until he surpassed them all. Desiring to increase his labors, he departed into the desert, and finding an abandoned fortress in the mountain, he made his dwelling in it, training himself in extreme fasting, unceasing prayer, and fierce conflicts with the demons. Here he remained for about twenty years. Saint Athanasius the Great, who knew him personally and wrote his life, says that he came forth from that fortress "initiated in the mysteries and filled with the Spirit of God." Afterwards, because of the press of the faithful, who deprived him of his solitude, he was enlightened by God to journey with certain Bedouins, until he came to a mountain in the desert near the Red Sea, where he passed the remaining part of his life. Saint Athanasius says of him, "His countenance had a great and wonderful grace. This gift also he had from the Savior. For if he were present in a great company of monks, and any one who did not know him previously wished to see him, immediately coming forward, he passed by the rest and hurried to Anthony, as though attracted by his appearance; his serenity of his manner and the purity of his soul." So Passing his life, and becoming an example of virtue and a rule for monastics, he reposed on January 17 in the year 356, having lived altogether some

Καθως μελετουμεν την σημερινην Ευαγγελικην περικοπην, γνωριζομεν οτι οι εννεα λεπροι οι οποιοι εθεραπευθηκαν απο τον Χριστον οχι μονον δεν επροσεγγισαν τον Χριστον για να Τον δοξασουν ως Αληθινος Θεος, αλλα ειχαν χαθη εντελως. Οσο ειναι χαμενος ο ανθρωπος, ετσι ειναι σε απογνωση, και, αντι να προσεγγιση τον Θεον δια της προσευχης και συμμετοχης στα Αχραντα Μυστηρια, ριχνει τον εαυτον του σε μεσα διαφυγης, τα οποια μπορουν να τον οδηγησουν ακομα σε κακο, προκαλωντας ακομα μεγαλυτερη απογνωση.

God through prayer and the Sacraments, people throw themselves into means of escape which actually lead to harm, thereby bringing on even more depression.

The one leper who did give thanks for his cure to Christ our God and who glorified Him is a good example for all of us of the proper relationship that we are to have with the Lord so that we can maintain the health of our souls, leading to Eternal Life.

We live in an age in which people deny the very existence of sin. Accordingly, one suffers supposedly from some level of emotional illness, or, in the tone of "political correctness," everything and anything is acceptable as long as it is legal. When Christians speak of sin, they are often criticized as being "old fashioned" and "out of touch" with reality. At the same time, perplexingly so, the issue of guilt is still very much a real one, in general. How do we deal with guilt, which can easily eat up the human soul, just as leprosy dissolves the human body?

The Church turns to the one leper who gave thanks to Christ as an illustration showing what we can do. Being a foreigner, this leper certainly was not concerned about popularity in displaying his gratitude to Christ, Who Himself was a controversial Person among the leading class of Pharisees. We, too, are to be as humble and unconcerned about the opinion of others, as long as we seek to please God. This leper *returned* to God. This is a sign of *repentance*. Our sense of "being O.K." is ultimately worthless, unless we are with God, Who "forgives us our trespasses *as* (meaning, "at the same time" and "just like") we forgive others their trespasses." The cured leper fell down at the feet of Jesus, glorifying Him as God, for the man's *faith* made him well, as our Lord said. Glorifying God goeshand-in-glove with "falling down" to worship Him with sincere faith. In all things we are to be humble by having total faith in God.

Whatever we have to offer God pales compared to what our Lord truly wants: "A sacrifice to God is a broken spirit, a broken and humbled heart God will not despise." (Psalm 50:19). "Genuine repentance (return to God) is characterized by such things as confession to God (verse 4-8); inward purity (verses 12-26); and inward humility (verses 17-21." (Orthodox Study Bible, pg. 715). These are, in fact, actual personality traits that are to characterize every Christian's behavior and mannerisms. +FR. THEODORE
