- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

THE APOLOGY OF POPE FRANCIS

From today's Gospel passage, we heard that our Lord called His Apostles to become "fishers of men" — that is, to bring humanity to repentance, meaning that people depart from the road that leads to sin and return to the road that leads toward God. Indeed, as successors of the Holy Apostles, the preaching of the Church has always been (and still is) to repent from false teachings and sinful behaviors. The call for repentance, however, has been mis-stated by many political and religious analysts of today's world and many suggest that

either repentance from sins is not necessary, given our atmosphere of "complete freedom," or that the idea of repentance implies some sense of hatred against people who do fall into sin.

Given this world-wide mentality, it was reported that the Pope of Rome, Francis, issued an "apology" last week on behalf of his Church for "marginalizing" gays and women. Of course, what Pope Francis actually said, compared to what the media reported that he said may be two dif-

ferent things. If he meant to say that individual Christians should apologize for showing hatred or for using hate-speech regarding homosexuals or women -or anybody, for that matter—we must all agree. If, however, the Pope is apologizing for the Church's stance regarding homosexual behaviors and the issue of women's rights vs. the right to life, he is calling into question Christian morality. It is one thing to note that behaviors related to homosexual acts are sins, as are behaviors related to adultery, fornication, pornography, prostitution, pre-marital sex, etc. Indeed, these are all sins. On the other hand, we must never condemn any human being, knowing that he or she is loved by Christ our God. Each person is destined to "fight the good fight" against temptations and passions according to his or her own strength and with the grace of God. Regarding women, it is one thing to disrespect women in any way, which the Church must always condemn as sinful. Yet, abortions committed in the name of women's rights is also a matter of grave sin—and there can be no "apology" for this teaching.

The "apology" from Pope Francis, therefore, as reported in the news, appears to be vague and causes great confusion. Extending the sentiments spun by the press to a logical conclusion, I suppose that eventually, we may all have to apologize for the Ten Commandments!

Indeed, we all must "apologize" for individual sins, but if the moral teachings of the Church are themselves considered to be "sins" for which we must "apologize," then we are missing the whole point of Christian life. Repentance from sins is key to the Christian life-style. The way of repentance, in turn, requires *spiritual warfare*. A simple apology lacks the essence of the prayer of the Divine Liturgy for the reading of the Gospel: "Merciful Master, cause the pure light of Your divine knowledge to shine in our hearts and open the eyes of our minds to perceive the message of Your Gospel; ...so that, trampling down our fleshly desires, we may seek a heavenly citizenship, considering and doing those things that are well pleasing to You." This prayer is directed for us to judge ourselves, not others. Spiritual warfare is a warfare against the temptations or passions within our own souls, in keeping with the teachings of the Church. It is not a warfare against other people. One's participation in the Holy Sacraments depends on his or her efforts to maintain the dignity of the Church's teachings in one's own daily way of life.

The Pope needs to talk about *spiritual warfare*, without "apology," and we all need to join in such a conversation. While the truth is that we all sin ("Whoever is without sin, cast the first stone."), without *spiritual warfare*, we lose our moral compass. Let us not apologize for identifying sins and encouraging the *spiritual warfare* within the soul of each individual in the fight to do "those things that are well pleasing to God." +FR. THEODORE
