Holy Communion Order

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- 2. Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

TO LIVE IN ONE OF TWO WORLDS

The words "frame of mind" describe our view in relation to the world around us and ourselves within this world. The unbeliever sees himself or herself as a person within a *materialistic* world. The faithful Christian views himself or herself as a person within a *spiritual* world.

In this regard, there exist "two worlds" and the one world is something quite the opposite of the other. For this reason, the cares of one person completely

differ from those of another. For example, an atheist cares for materialistic benefits...the Christian cares for spiritual benefits. The unbeliever worries that perhaps he or she has no money, while the Christian worries that perhaps he or she lacks the love of God within his or her soul.

None of the stones or metals of the world have a conscience. They have no ethical value. In the end, however, the world's rocks and metals are simply idols that have no power to Continued on page 2

ST. JAMES THE GREAT MARTYR OF PERSIA

This Saint was from the city of Bythlaba and was of noble birth; he was the closest and most honoured friend of Isdiger (or Yazdegerd) I, King of Persia (reigned 399-420). Though a Christian from his youth, James renounced Christ because he was allured by the King's friendship and flatteries. When his mother and his wife learned of this, they declared to him by letter that they would have nothing more to do with him, since he had preferred a glory that is temporal to the love of Christ. Wounded in soul by these words and coming to himself, the Saint wept over his error, and repudiated the worship of the idols. Therefore, becoming exceedingly wroth, the King - this was Bahram (or Varahran) V (reigned 421-438), Isdiger's son and successor - condemned him to a most bitter death, the likes of which not even a brute beast was ever condemned to: that is, his body was dismembered at every joint of his arms and legs. And so, when he had been cut asunder limb by limb to his very hips and shoulders, the courageous Martyr was finally beheaded, in the year 421.

Η λεξις <νοοτροπια> περιγραφει την αποψιν μας σχετικως με πως θεωρουμεν τον κοσμον γυρω μας και τον εαυτον μας εντος του κοσμου αυτου. Ο απιστος θεωρει τον εαυτον του ως προσωπο μεσα σε <υλικον> κοσμον. Ο ευσεβης Χριστιανος θεωρει τον εαυτον του ως προσωπο μεσα σε <πνευματι-κον> κοσμον.

Ως εκ τουτου, υπαρχουν <δυο κοσμοι> και ο ενας κοσμος ειναι κατι το αντίθετο απο τον αλλον. Για αυτον τον λογον, οι φροντίδες του ενος ανθρωπου διαφερονται απο τις φροντίδες του αλλου—ως παραδείγμα, ο απίστος φροντίζει για τα υλικα συμφεροντα...ομως, ο πίστος φροντίζει για τα πνευματικα συμφεροντα. Ο απίστος στενοχωρείται μηπως δεν έχει χρηματα και ο πίστος Χριστίανος στενοχωρείται μηπως δεν έχει μέσα στην ψυχην του την αγαπην του Θεου.

Τα πλουτη της γης δεν εχουν συνειδησιν...δεν εχουν ηθικην αξιαν. Τα πλουτη ειναι τα ειδωλα, τα οποια δεν σωζουν τον ανθρωπον, τελικως. Για αυτο το ρητον του Θεου μας Χριστου τονιζει την πραγματικοτηταν περι της αιωνιοτητος: δηλαδη οτι ειναι αδυνατον να εισελθη ο πλουσιος στην Βασιλειαν του Θεου, διοτι, απλως, ο απιστος δεν φροντιζει για να εισελθη στην αιωνιαν Βασιλειαν αυτην.

Ο απιστος χρησιμοποιει τα πλουτη για να ικανοποιηση τον εγωισμον του. Ο πιστος Χριστιανος χρησιμοποιει τα πλουτη ως ευκαιριαν να δοξαση τον Θεον δια μεσων των εναρετων εργων της αγαπης. deliver salvation. This is why the maxim delivered by Christ our God emphasizes an eternal truth: that it is impossible for a rich man to enter the Kingdom of God. It is because he or she simply does not believe in the True God, but in the false gods of stones, rocks and metals and does not care about entering God's Kingdom.

An unbeliever tends to use wealth to enhance his or her ego, while a pious Christian is prone to use wealth as an opportunity to glorify God through deeds of love.

Going a step further in the effort to understand the difference between the two worlds of humanity, we can say that the lottery is precious wealth to an unbeliever, while the Holy Sacraments are, collectively, precious wealth to a sincere Christian — two views of wealth leading an individual into one of two different types of lives: one being in hell; the other being in heaven.

This translates in concrete terms to a reality in which the balance between time with loved ones and hours with work; patience and politeness—as well as prayer—are trade-marks of relationships in which the value of individuals is defined by the love of Christ our God, rather than simply by material advantages.

We should review our Lord's words, "What is impossible for men is possible with God." (St. Luke 18:27). Whole systems of government have been promoted for the purpose of insuring equality for all and guaranteeing everyone's happiness. However, history has proven that "it is impossible for men" to create paradise on earth. Christ is calling us to put all of our faith in Him, rather than in human powers. Doing this requires prayer. Indeed, we might often find ourselves thinking of prayer as a seemingly "futile" effort to do something nice. However, sincere prayer from the depths of our souls brings upon us the Divine energy and wisdom that is needed for us to work with God in bringing about miracles. Not even one of our Saints brought about wonders for the benefit of others without first giving themselves over to prayer, because prayer connects us to Christ our God, confirming that all things are indeed possible through Him.

Central to our possibilities with God, we are reminded of the power of prayer as we celebrate the Divine Liturgy. As we participate in the Liturgy, we hear the priest exclaim, "Let us lift up our hearts." It is a calling for us give ourselves over to prayer with all of our being.

ANTIPHON I: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou..." (By the prayers of the Theotokos...)

<u>Verse 1—</u> Bless the Lord, O my soul, and everything within me, bless His Holy Name.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, soter, soson imas."

<u>Verse 2—</u>: Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His rewards.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

<u>Verse 3—</u>: The Lord prepared His thone in heaven and His Kingdom rules over all.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, soter, soson imas.

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

ANTIPHON II: "Soson imas Ie Theou..." (Save us, O Son of God...)

HYMN for St. James the Martyr from Persia: O Martys Sou Kyrie...(Your Martyr, O Lord, was worthily awarded by You the crown of incorruption, in that he contested for You our immortal God. Since he possessed Your power, he defeated the tyrants, dashing the demons' powerless displays of defiance. O Christ God, at his fervent entreaties, save our souls.

<u>Hymn for St. George</u>: Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis...(As the one who sets the captives free and the protector of the poor; as physician to the sick and the champion defender of kings, bearer of trophies are you, O Great Martyr George, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.)

<u>Kontakion Hymn</u>: Ee Parthenos symeron...(On this day the Virgin Maid goes to the grotto to give birth to the pre-eternal Word in an ineffable manner.
