Holy Communion Order

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

THE POWER OF FORGIVENESS

In the official documents of the Holy and Great Council of the Orthodox Church (which took place in the summer of 2016), there is a document with the title: "The Importance of Fasting and Its Observance Today," in which we learn that fasting is a spiritual effort. It refers to the words of St. Basil: "Let us fast in a way that is an acceptable way of fasting. True fasting is the opposition against evil; the control of our manner of speech; the avoidance of anger; our separa-

tion from desires; from condemning others; from falsehood and from senseless oaths...In such spiritual efforts true fasting is found." (On Fasting 2,7, PG 31—Paragraph 3 of the Document). All of the documents of the Holy Council can be readily found on the Internet website: www.holycouncil.org

Indeed, this herein description of according to St. Basil, regarding the true nature of fasting, agrees with the teaching of St. Paul, as we heard today during the reading from his Epis

FORGIVENESS SUNDAY

The first commandment that God gave to man was that of fasting, which Adam and Eve received but did not keep; and not only did they not become gods, as they had imagined, but they lost even that blessed life which they had, and they fell into corruption and death, and transmitted these and innumerable other evils to all of mankind. The God-bearing Fathers set these things before us today, that by bringing to mind what we have fallen from, and what we have suffered because of the disobedience of Adam and Eve, we might be diligent to return again to that ancient bliss and glory by means of fasting and obedience to all the Divine commands. Taking occasion from today's Gospel (Matt. 6:14-21) to begin the Fast unencumbered by enmity, we also ask forgiveness this day, first from God, then from one another and all creation.

Accroding to St. Symeon of Thessalonika, "[The Lord's Prayer]...In the request for forgiveness is contained all the wisdom and power of the sacred Gospel, for it was primarily to forgive our sins and trespasses that the Word of God, our living Savior, came into the world...Because we sin even after baptism, we pray that He might forgive us our debts if we do not bear a grudge: for God has me as an example, and what I do to others, He does to me." and St. Germanos of Constantinople adds, "God, then, appoints the person who prays to be his own judge." In other words, if salvation depends on our forgiveness of others, if we do not forgive, we condemn ourselves.

tle to the Romans: "Put off from yourselves works of darkness and put on the garments wearing the tools of the light...Put on the Lord Jesus Christ and make no provision for the flesh to gratify its desires." (Romans 13:11-12).

Great Lent begins tomorrow. It is a season for us to renew our personal relationship with Christ, along with that of our fellow human beings so that we can live according to the petition that we hear during the celebration of the Divine Liturgy: "Let us ask for a Christian ending to our lives, painless, blameless, peaceful and for a good defense before the awesome Judgment Seat of Christ."

Forgiveness stands at the forefront of our defense at this awesome Judgment. It follows, then, that the heart of the Lord's Prayer is, in fact, the theme of forgiveness. As we study the Lord's Prayer, we come to understand that the Prayer itself is the proven formula for avoiding evil in our lives—and avoiding evil is necessary if we are to be prepared to meet Christ in His Kingdom.

Who forgives? God, Who is both the Creator of the heavens and the earth, is also "our Father" and cares for us, claiming us as His own. His Name is to be respected (hallowed) above all others—there are no other gods—and, indeed, we are not gods. We are weak creatures who require day-to-day strength. "Give us this day our daily bread"...the "bread" is Christ our God. Christ is all we need for to-day's bodily and spiritual sustenance. St. Athanasios says: "Christ taught us in this prayer to ask in the present day for the 'epiousion arton' (i.e., the bread to come) of which we have the first fruits in the present life when we partake of the flesh of the Lord."

In truth, Christ is fully Man and fully God. As Man, He suffered what we suffer; as God He conquered death by death and gives us Eternal Life. It is God Who forgives us! It is God that forgives the people we do not want to forgive. That is why we must forgive them also, for they are not our property, but they belong to God. That is why St. Paul asks, "Who are you to judge another's servant?" (Romans 14: 4)

From *forgiveness* come all the other things for which we pray. Forgiveness "leads us not into temptations" and resisting temptations "delivers us from evil."

Chanter/Choir: Lord, I have cried unto You, hear me. Hear me, O Lord. O Lord I cry out to You, hear me when I call out unto You. To You is due praise./ Receive my prayer as incense before You; I stretch out my hands to You as an evening sacrifice. Hear me, O Lord. (*The Deacon censes the icons and the faithful*).

From the depths I cry out to You, O Lord; Lord, hear the sound of my voice.

Let us make haste to humble the flesh by abstinence, as we set out upon the God-given course of the holy Fast; and with prayers and tears, let us seek our Lord and Savior. Laying aside all memories of evil, let us cry out and say: we have sinned against You, O Christ our King. Save us as the people of Nineveh in the days of old and in Your compassion make us partakers of Your Heavenly Kingdom.

If You should mark iniquities, O Lord, Lord, who would be able to be justified? Only from You is found mercy. When I think of my works, deserving every punishment, I despair of myself, O Lord. Behold, I have despised Your precious Commandments and wasted my life as did the Prodigal. Therefore, I entreat You: cleanse me through the waters of repentance and, through prayer and fasting, make me shine with light. For, You alone are merciful. Do not reject me, O Benefactor of all, Who is supreme in love.

Glory be to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages. Amen.

Let us set out with joy upon the season of the Fast, and prepare ourselves for spiritual warfare. Let us purify our souls and cleanse our flesh. As we fast from food, let us abstain also from every passion. Priest: THE DISMISAL PRAYERS -The priest then asks the faithful to venerate the icons and to exchange one-by-one to each other the "kiss of peace", saying, "Forgive me."
