- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

PEACE IN OUR HOUSE

"There are thousands of people in America who have their names on church rolls. They go to church when it is convenient... They may talk the language of the Christian and many of them can quote verses from Scripture, but they have never really experienced true repentance. They have a sort of 'takeit-or-leave-it' attitude toward religion. They turn to God and pray when they get in a tight place, but the rest of the time they give not God very much thought." (Peace with God, by Billy Graham, pg. 147). Billy Graham describes the general condition of our American society. People are Christians on Sunday and pagans on Monday...and we Orthodox Christians are a part of this society.

This is why it is difficult for us to comprehend the deep meaning of to-day's Gospel passage, through which we heard about the repentance of the tax-collector, Zacchaeus. He worked hard to climb the sycamore tree to see Christ. His effort represents the spiritual effort that we are all to make in *continued on page 2*

ST. TIMOTHY THE APOSTLE & MARTYR

St. Timothy was Paul's companion in many of his journeys. His mother, Eunice, and his grandmother, Lois, are mentioned as eminent for their piety (II Timothy 1:5). We know nothing of his father but that he was a Greek (Acts 16:1). He is first brought into notice at the time of Paul's second visit to Lystra (Acts 16:2), where he probably resided, and where it seems he was converted during Paul's first visit to that place (I Timothy 1:2; II Timothy 3:11). The apostle having formed a high opinion of his "own son in the faith," arranged that he should become his companion (Acts 16:3)

According to tradition, Paul ordained Timothy Bishop of Ephesus in AD 65, where he served for 15 years. In 80, Timothy tried to halt a pagan procession of idols, ceremonies, and songs. In response to his preaching of the Gospel, the angry pagans beat him, dragged him through the streets, and stoned him to death.

In the 4th century, his relics were transferred to the Church of the Holy Apostles in Constantinople. The Church also numbers Timothy among the 70 apostles sent out by <u>Jesus Christ</u> to preach the Gospel.

Οταν ο Ζακχαιος εκατεβηκε απο την συκομορεαν, εδειξε ταπεινοφροσυνην, ετσι ωστε να επιτρεψει τον Χριστον να εισελθει στην ψυχην του.

order to flee tempting situations and to correct our faults. Spiritual life is a life of contemplation about the writings of our Orthodox Church and daily prayer. It is a choice that we make each moment so that we can control our thoughts and our motives. When Zacchaeus came down from the sycamore tree, he showed *humility*, by which he allowed Christ to enter his soul.

In fact, humility has at least two aspects: 1) the willingness to "climb up, outside of ourselves," up into a view of reality—looking for Christ our God instead of looking for self interests; 2) the willingness to "climb down" from our perch of pride and surrender to Christ by seeking His Will. Zacchaeus displayed this humility by both looking for Christ and also obeying Christ.

Unfortunately, some of today's Christianity, as Billy Graham implies, is of a "self-serving" sort. This is pride! As a result, many Christians are deceived into believing that we can be free from sin by assuming that the Bible itself is mistaken. Such pride, however, is countered by humility, and humility goes hand-in-hand with obedience. In truth, behaviors demonstrating disobedience to God's teaching in the Bible are sins. It is *repentance* frees us from sins.

The lesson of Zacchaeus is given clearly by Tito Colliander in his book, The Way of the Ascetics. "Jesus tells Zacchaeus: 'make haste and come down; for today I must abide at your house.' (Luke 19:5). House here can be understood as the heart. In other words, 'Make haste now to humble yourself lest you think you are better than others, for it is in the heart of the humble that I must dwell.' Zacchaeus now received Christ and the first thing he did was to give away all that he possessed...Zacchaeus knew that the heart which receives Christ must empty itself of everything else: it must offer all it has...'the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the thoughts of pride. (1 John 2:16)." (pgs. 102-103).

There are many opportunities in our own houses for us to bring peace to all of America. The people in our lives rely on us to pray for them; to help them do their work; to accomplish some worthwhile task. Our efforts to respond to them by doing Christ's Will, given our own limitations, shows the virtue of obedience. Furthermore, through obedience, we respect the "Image of Christ" in the person next to us. This goes far in terms of peaceful and loving relationships. Our "house," therefore, is comprised of everyone in our lives wherever we go. Let us allow Christ to truly enter our "house" where we live—our "house" where we work or study and the "house" of our community at large.

ANTIPHON I: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou..." (By the prayers of the Theotokos...)

<u>Verse 2—</u> Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His rewards.

<u>Verse 3—</u> The Lord prepared His throne in heaven, and His Kingdom rules over all.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, soter, soson imas.



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
