- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

#### **OUR LORD & MASTER**

Today, from the reading of the passage from the Gospel of St. Matthew, we heard of the incident in which the Canaanite Woman met Christ. We know that God enlightened this woman, even though she was not "of the lost sheep of Israel." As God enlightened the Prophet David, He enlightened the Canaanite Woman so that she would seek God's love, even though she felt that she was unworthy.

We compare the words of the Prophet

David with those of the Canaanite Woman. David says, "A sacrifice to God is a contrite spirit. A contrite and humble heart, God will not despise." (Psalm 50:19). The Canaanite Woman says, "Yes, Lord, but even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table." (St. Matthew 15:27). Like David, this woman's soul was "contrite and humble." The Canaanite idols did not have the love nor the power to cure her daughter. Even Christ ignored her, saying, "It is not good to take the children's bread and give Continued on page 2

#### THE THREE HIERARCHS

St. Basil the Great, St. John Chrysosotm, and St. Gregory the Theologian are the Three Hierarchs that will be commemorated with the celebration of the Divine Liturgy tomorrow.

This common feast of these three teachers was instituted a little before the year 1100, during the reign of the Byzantine-Roman Emperor Alexis I Comnenus, because of a dispute and strife that arose among the notable and virtuous men of that time. Some of them preferred Basil, while others preferred Gregory, and yet others preferred John Chrysostom, quarreling among themselves over which of the three was the greatest.

the three Saints appeared together to the saintly John Mavropous, a monk who had been ordained Bishop of Euchaita, a city of Asia Minor, they revealed to him that the glory they have at the throne of God is equal, and told him to compose a common service for the three of them, which he did with great skill and beauty.

Συνγκρινουμεν τα λογια του Προφητου Δαυιδ με τα λογια της Χαναναιας. Ο Δαυιδ λεγει: <Θυσια τω Θεω, πνευμα συντετριμμενον, καρδιαν συντετριμμενην και τεταπει– νωμενην ο Θεος ουκ εξουδενωσει.> (Ψαλ. 50:19). Η Χαναναια λεγει: <Ναι, Κυριε, και γαρ τα κυναρια εσθιει απο των ψιχιων των πιπτοντων απο της τραπεζης των κυριων *αυτων>.* (Ματθ. 15:27). Οπως ο Δαυιδ, η ψυχη της Χαναναιας ηταν <συντετριμμενη και τεταπεινωμενη.> Τα ειδωλα των Χαναναιων δεν ειχαν την αγαπην, ουτε την δυναμιν να θεραπευσουν την κορην της. Ακομη και ο Χριστος την αγνοησε, καθως ειπε: <Ουκ εστι καλον λαβειν τον αρτον των τεκνων και βαλειν τοις κυναριοις.> (Ματθ. 15:26).

Με συντετριμμενην ψυχην, η Χαναναι επαραδεχθηκε την χαμηλην της σταση ενωπιον του Θεου.Αντιπροσωπευει ολους μας, αφου η αμαρτια μας ριχνει στην ιδιαν χαμηλην στασην με την <ξενην> Χαναναιαν. Αλλα, μας εμπνεει η Χαναναια, ως επμνευσμενη απο τον Θεον, να φθασουμεν στο ιδιο υψηλο πνευματικο επιπεδο της δια μεσου της θερμης πιστεως-δια της οποιας θα μπορεσουμεν να ομολογησουμεν οτι ο Ιησους Χριστος ειναι στην πραγματικοτηταν ο Κυριος της ζωης μας. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

give it to the dogs." (St. Matthew 15:26).

With a humble soul, the Canaanite Woman accepted her low status before God. She represents all of us, since sin throws us down to the same status as that of this "foreign" woman. However, this same Canaanite Woman inspires us, as one inspired by God, to reach her same high spiritual status through sincere faith by which we confess that Christ is in truth the Lord of our lives.

She called Him "Lord" ("Yes, <u>Lord</u>, but even the dogs...") and "Master" ("eat the crumbs that fall from their <u>master's</u> table."). Mystically, she foretells of the Sacrament of Holy Communion which is given to us from the Holy Altar Table. Her confession of faith in Christ is the "great faith" through which her demon-possessed daughter was saved, for the Name of Christ destroys demons.

The term "demon-possession" is greatly synonymous with the modern word: "addiction." Much of addiction is a matter of an illness of soul. This is why so many addicts recover once they turn to God. They struggle one day at a time, praying, "give us this day our daily bread," - the word "bread," meaning the strength and wisdom that comes from God – and which, to a deeper level, ultimately leads to the Bread and Wine that the Holy Spirit changes into the Body and Blood of Christ. We are all addicts in some way! Some are addicts to food; others are addicts to material possessions; some are addicts to sexual fantasies; others are addicts to popularity, while still others are addicts to power. Then, there are those who are addicts to drugs and alcohol, no less worse off spiritually than the others. We have much to fear from ourselves, given the lengths to which, without self-control, we can go to satisfy these addictions, which if unsatisfied, lead to great anxiety, anger, depression and maybe violence. Demons addict us to false gods.

Today's gods may promise total equality and utopia for everyone, including the sinner and the saint, but they will disappoint us, just like the Canaanite idols failed the Canaanite Woman, because there is no love from idols. They could never address her ingrained Godgiven capacity to love another human being as much as she loved herself. As her daughter suffered, she, too, suffered. Her daughter's cure, was her cure, as well. This capacity comes from God's breath within each person, which we know to be the human soul. Unphased by her "inequality," she shouldered her *responsibility* to find a cure for her daughter. Her search ended when she met the True God of Love and Salvation, through Whom all things were created, Jesus Christ our "Lord" and "Master" (to use her words). He is the only God Who suffers with us and for us. He is in our midst. For this reason, He also lovingly saves us.

ANTIPHON I: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou..." (By the prayers of the Theotokos...)

<u>Verse 1—</u> Bless the Lord, O my soul, and everything within me, bless His holy name.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, soter, soson imas."

<u>Verse 2</u>— Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His rewards.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

<u>Verse 3 – The Lord prepared His throne in heaven, and His Kingdom rules over all.</u>

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, soter, soson imas.

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

ANTIPHON II: "Soson imas Ie Theou..." (Save us, O Son of God...)

<u>Verse 1 —</u> Praise the Lord, O my soul! I shall praise the Lord while I live; I shall sing to my God as long as I exist.

Refrain: "Soson imas, Yie Theou, O Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si alleluia."

<u>Verse 2</u> - Blessed is he whose help is the God of Jacob; his hope is in the Lord his God.

Refrain: "Save us, O Son of God, Who arose from the dead, we sing to You, Alleluia."

Verse 3 - The Lord shall reign forever; your God, O Zion, to all generations.

Refrain: "Soson imas Ie Theou, O Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si alleluia."

Doxa Patri ke Io ke Aghio Pnevmati ke nin ke aei ke eis tous eonas ton eonon.

People: "O Monogenis Ios ke Logos tou Theou..." (O Only-Begotten Son and Word of God...)

<u>Sunday Resurrection Hymn</u>: Katelisas to Stavro Sou ton thanaton...[Tone 7] (O Lord by Your sacred Cross You abolished death and granted unto the thief blessed paradise. The Myrrh-bearers ceased lamenting and turned to joy. The Apos-tles did preach the good news at Your command that You had risen from the dead, O Christ our God, be-stowing Your mercy upon the world evermore..)

Hymn for St. Ignatius, Bishop of Antioch: Ke tropon metochos, ke thronon diadhochos...(Becoming a partner with the Apostles in way of life and successor to their thrones, O God-inspired Saint, in the active life you found an entrance to contemplation. Hence you rightly expounded the word of truth, and you shed your blood in struggling for the faith, O Hieromartyr Ignatius. Intercede with Christ our God, beseeching Him to save our souls.)




