### **Holy Communion Order**

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- 2. Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

### **ENERGIZED THROUGH CHRIST**

"I am crucified with Christ; I live; yet, it is not I who lives, but Christ lives in me." With these words, St. Paul, in his Epistle to the Galatians, emphasized that, in that we would live for the purpose of simply following the law, first, we would find that we do not follow it properly (in which case we will never be perfect people) and, second, our ego becomes a big issue in everything around us. The more our egos work in us, so much the less do we allow Christ to guide us.

As Christ lives in us, we find that we perform deeds of love—deeds which do not transgress any law. This is why St. Paul would never boast about being a "man of the law", but he would boast about being a man of Christ. When he wrote, "Christ lives in me," he meant that all of his thoughts; all of his hopes; all of his motives had their beginning in his love for Christ. In reality, we are speaking about the spiritual life of each Christian.

### THE TWO EVENTS RELATED IN TODAY'S GOSPEL PASSAGE

Opening our *Orthodox Study Bibles*, we learn much about the significance of the healing of the ailing woman and the raising from the dead of Jairus' daughter:

"For the Jews, contact with blood caused defilement and led to religious and social isolation. The woman displays bold faith by approaching both Christ and the ruler of the synagogue in a crowd, potentially defiling all of them and subjecting herself to ridicule. Who touched Me?" does not simply mean a physical touch, but rather, 'Who touched Me in faith?' Just as 'the temple sanctifies the gold (Mt. 23:17), so also matter is sanctified by Christ's Incarnation and the power of Christ works through even His garment. To touch Christ's garment in faith is to touch Him. In the Church, we touch Christ through icons, oil, water, bread, wine, etc. When this is done in faith, the power of Christ is received." (pg. 1381)

"[The raising from the dead of Jairus' daughter] is one of three resurrections performed by our Lord as recorded in the Gospels. They confirm the promise given to the Prophet Ezekiel that God will one day open the graves and raise all the dead (Ezk.37:1-14). Many people have exercised authority over the living; only the Son of God 'has power over both the living and the dead' (funeral Service)..." (pg. 1377)

<Χριστω συνεσταυρωμαι-ζω δε ουκετι εγω,ζη δε εν εμοι Χριστος.> Με αυτα τα λογια, ο Αποστολος Παυλος ετονισε στηνΕπιστολην του προς τους Γαλατας οτι, οσο ζουμεν μονον με σκοπον να τηρησουμεν τους νομους, πρωτον, δεν τους τηρουμεν οπως πρεπει (οποτε δεν ειμεθα ποτε <τελειοι> ανθρωποι), και, δευτερον, ο εγωισμος μας γινεται μεγαλο θεμα σε ολες τις υποθεσεις της ζωης μας. Οσο πιο πολυ δουλευει ο εγωισμος μεσα μας, τοσο πιο λιγο επιτρεπουμεν τον Χριστον να μας καθοδηγησει.

Οσο ζη ο Χριστος <εν ημιν>, τοσο τελουμεν εργα αγαπης – εργα τα οποια δεν παραβιαζουν κανεναν νομον. Για αυτον τον λογον, ο Αποστολος Παυλος δεν εκαυχοταν οτι ηταν <ανθρωπος του νομους>, αλλα εκαυχοταν οτι ηταν ανθρωπος του Χριστου. Οταν εγραψε <ζη εν εμοι Χριστος> εννοησε οτι ολες οι σκεψεις του και ολες οι ελπιδες του και ολοι οι σκοποι του ειχαν αρχη στην αγαπην του για τον Χριστον. Στην πραγματικοτηταν ομιλουμεν για το θεμα της πνευματικης ζωης του Χριστιανου.

Η σημερινη Ευαγγελικη περικοπη μας διδασκει οτι η προσευχη μας πρεπει να συνοδευεται με πιστην: 1) την πιστην της γυναικός <ουσης εν ρυσει αιματός> και 2) την πιστην του Ιαειρου. Στην σημερινην περικοπην της Επιστολης του Απ. Παυλου, μαθαινουμεν οτι ο Αγιος Παυλος τελικως υπονοει οτι η αρετη της πιστεως οριζεται ως την γνωση οτι ο Χριστος ο Θεος ειναι στην πραγματικοτηταν παρον στην ζωην μας. Μαλιστα, ο κυριος σκοπος της προσευχης ειναι να βιωσουμεν την <εν Χριστω Ζωην.>

+Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

Today's Gospel passage reminds us of *prayer with faith* - 1) the faith of the ailing woman and 2) the faith of Jairus. In the Epistle passage today, we learn that St. Paul ultimately implies that faith is defined as knowing that Christ our God is deeply present in our lives.

Indeed, the true intention and value of prayer is to live in Christ's Divine/Human presence, always experiencing *His great and pure energy*, graced with the *energy to create – to be co-creators with God...*to *inspire*, *energize and to save* others for His glory. The Light of Christ - His energy and wisdom - serve to allow us to participate in His Will, which, at the same time, offers us our purpose in life. The "life in Christ" is understood as a genuine *self-fulfillment* as God intended for each one of us born into the world.

While Christ our God took upon Himself human flesh, He did not forfeit His incredible Divine energy, which emanates from His very essence as True God. The Personhood of Christ our God is "Light from Light." Metropolitan Hierotheos of Nafpaktos writes, "In the vision of God, the Saints see three lights. At the same time they also see the difference between them, because one is the source of the other two; the second comes from the first, but has a human nature, so that the body too is a source of the uncreated Light, and the third comes from the first, but has no human nature...[Thus], when the Saints attain experience of God, in their vision of God and participation in Him, they see very well that God is light. John the Evangelist declares, 'God is light.'" (The Person in the Orthodox Tradition, pgs. 169 & 204).

Christ's presence is very much like that of *light* in our lives, although light has a totally different essence than our own. Yet, it exists throughout our being. If we understand the event of Christ's Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor, where He revealed His Divinity as Uncreated Light and listen to His own words, "I am the Light of the World," we can understand, to the limit of our human capacity, how Christ "the Light" can be in us while we maintain our personhood. In other words, St. Paul is still St. Paul, but Christ lives in him as light exists in our brains, traveling throughout to give us sight.

In itself, light is tremendous energy! Truly, light has no gender, age, or race. Christ's Light is the tremendous Divine energy. It is grace freely given to all, much as the rays of the sun fall upon all of us. The Light of Christ is Divine energy, giving us divine, yet individual spiritual gifts. It is also what gives *consistency* to the life-style among all the Saints dating back to the age of the Apostles. All we have to do is *open our eyes* through the power of prayer and through participation in the Holy Sacraments.

Verse 3 – The Lord prepared His throne in heaven and His Kingdom rules over all.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

<u>Kontakion Hymn for this Sunday</u>- Prostasia ton Christianon...(A Protection of Christians unshamable; mediation with the Creator immovable. We sinners beg You: do not despise the voices of our prayers, but anticipate, since You are good, and swiftly come unto our aid as we cry out to You with faith: Hurry to intercession; and hasten to supplication, O Theotokos, Who defends at all times those who honor You.)




