Holy Communion Order

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

THE HOLY CROSS IS SALVATION

"Let it not be for me to boast except in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." (Galatians 6: 14). It seems that the ancient Christians were using the sign of the Holy Cross perhaps even right after Pentecost Sunday. Surely, not only from St. Paul's words that "he boasts in the Cross of the Lord," but also from the Book of Revelation we learn about the "sign upon the foreheads of believers." (Revelation 14:1).

The early Christian writer, St. Cyril of

Jerusalem, wrote in his <u>Catechetical Lectures</u>: "Let us then not be ashamed to preach the One Crucified. The Cross is the seal over everything we do—and for the bread that we eat and the cup that we drink; our entrances and exits, before going to sleep and after waking up in the morning...in our travels and at time when we rest." (<u>Catechesis</u>, xiii, 36). St. John Chrysostom reminds us that wherever the sign of the Cross is made, Jesus Christ our God is present with us.

THE JOY OF THE HOLY CROSS

During the celebration of the Divine Liturgy on Sundays, the priest reads a prayer calling for our joy in the Cross of our Lord and, subsequently, in His Resurrection from the dead. It is a prayer said in association with the Great Entrance when the Holy Gifts are brought out of the Altar in procession and placed on the Altar Table. In this prayer, these words are said, "For through the Cross, joy has come into the world."

It is evident that in the Orthodox way of thinking, the Cross and the empty tomb are inseparably united in the one event of God's great love. This is nothing less than "Good News." Like Mary Magdalene, we find ourselves first standing by the Cross in sober vigilance before beholding the empty tomb and then encountering the Risen Lord (John 20:11-18).

It may be difficult to us to "see" the joy that comes through the Cross until we find ourselves "on the other side." This is the meaning behind St. Paul's words: for "now we see in a glass darkly, but then face to face" (1 Corinthians 13:12). It is our hope and the "certainty" of our faith that Christ has

indeed triumphed over death, "even death on a Cross," as we read in St. Paul's Epistle to the Philippians (2:8).

Οπως μαθαινουμεν απο τον Αγ. Κυριλλον της Ιερουσαλημ (ενας απο τους αρχαιους Χριστιανους): <Ας μην ντρεπομαστε να κηρυξουμεν τον Εσταυρωμενον. Ο Σταυρος ειναι η σφραγις σε ολα, ακομη και για τον αρτον τον οποιον τρωμεν και για το ποτον το οποιο πινουμεν και στις εισοδους και εξοδους ημων, πριν απο τον υπνον και μετα απο το ξυπνημα το πρωι... στην πορειαν ημων και κατα τας ωρες αναπαυσεως.>(Κατηχητικη Ομιλια, 13, 36). Ο Αγ. Ιωαννης ο Χρυσοστομος μας υπενθυμιζει οτι οπου υπαραχει το σημειον του Σταυρου, εκει ειναι και ο Χριστος.

Ο Σταυρος εχει θειες δυναμεις: διωχνει τα δαιμονια, σβηνει τους πειρασμους, ενδυναμωνει την ψυχην, φωτιζει τον νουν, κηρυττει το Ευαγγελιον. Ειναι η συγχωρησεως, τον θανατον του θανατου και η οδος προς την αιωνίον ζωην με τον Ανασταντα εκ νεκρων Χριστον. Επισης, ειναι <η εικονα> για την προσευχην και η προσευχη περιλαμβανει την Σταυροπροσκυνησην μας. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

This is why the Cross has such great power: the Cross chases away demons; eradicates temptations; strengthens the soul and illumines the mind. It is forgiveness of sins; the death of death and the road to Eternal Life with the Risen Christ our God. In addition, the Cross is the "icon" before which we pray—and prayer includes our personal veneration of the Holy Cross. At the beginning of the Divine Liturgy, the form of the Holy Cross is made by the priest raising up the Gospel Book.

Thus, the Holy Cross defines and describes salvation. Salvation is our life on the Cross together with Christ, where death is blown away and Paradise is opened by the Resurrection from the dead of our Lord. The Cross and the Resurrection are the same event. The Divine Liturgy is our mystical participation in this event and living our lives in constant preparation for the Divine Liturgy and in the spirit of the Divine Liturgy is a daily life of the Cross and Resurrection. Orthodox spiritual life is the Cross with Christ. In our love for God and for others we either voluntarily "ascend" the Cross through prayer, fasting, almsgiving, etc., or we accept our "placement" on the Cross by God's grace, much like St. Paul accepted his "thorn in the flesh," knowing that Christ's power was at work through St. Paul's weakness in a ministry has guided humanity to the gates of salvation. Like St. Paul, we are often called to live in like manner.

The Holy Cross carries the grace and power of Christ our God, because His Body was nailed to it and His Blood was shed upon it—and, as many of our Saints remind us, God assumed our flesh so that we may assume His grace. This is why our Lord said, "I no longer call you servants, but friends. I call you friends, because all things that I heard from My Father, I make known to you." (St. John 15:15). This "making known to us" is revealed in the lives of Saints throughout the Church's history not simply as "head knowledge," but as real experience through the grace of the Holy Spirit—an experience that is, in essence, divine. In other words, it is a genuine participation in God's powers.

The Cross, therefore, is not simply a symbol. It is the power of God in our lives with Christ on His Cross, which is at the same time our cross. Let us allow Christ our God to participate in our individual "crosses" as much as He allows us to participate in His Cross, which is the gateway to the Resurrection and our Eternal Salvation. +FR. Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

Verse 3— God is in her midst; she shall not be shaken; God shall help her early in the morning.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

ANTIPHON II: "Soson imas Ie Theou..." (Save us, O Son of God...)

<u>Hymn for St. George</u> — Os ton echmaloton eleftherotis... (Since you are a deliverer of captives and a defender of the poor; a physician for the sick and a noble attendant to kings, O Great among the Martyrs and Glorious George, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.)

Kontakion Hymn: Ioakim ke Anna oneethismou...(Both Joachim and Anna from their sterility's stigma, and Adam and Eve from their mortality's ruin have been set free, O immaculate Maid, by your holy nativity. For this do your people hold celebration, redeemed from the guilt of transgression as they cry to you, "The barren one bears the Theotokos, the nourisher of our Life.")
