WE ARE APOSTLES!

As Christ sent His Apostles into the world in order to be "fishermen of human beings," so also He sends us into the world today, in which the philosophical environment is similar to that of Apostolic times. Popular thinking held man to be the measure of all things with ideals of the "greatest good for the most people." This encouraged people to eventually worshiping emperors as gods. Today we have "political correctness," to the extent that, if the Name of God seems to offend some people, pray-

er can no longer be tolerated.

Today's Gospel, in essence, asks us to be apostles of Christ our True God. Therefore, it seems to be a worthy effort for us to understand the thinking and priorities of the Apostles who, in fact, created a Christian society in their own age. Understanding the "spiritual rhythm" of the Apostles allows us to consider turning our efforts toward protecting our own faithful from *Continued on page 2*

ABORTION, THE ENVIRONMENT, AND THE FAITH -Questions have arisen about our Church's position regarding the protection of the environment and the ending of abortion, wondering if our Church is becoming politically involved in worldly affairs. In answer, the Church is responsible to advocate for the glory of Christ our God and for continuing His life-giving ministry. The Church is no more "political" than was St. John the Baptist, who asked King Herod to repent of marriage to his brother's sister, Herodias. The Church proclaims the teachings of our Lord to the world: abortion is the unjust taking of innocent human life; preserving the environment is our duty as stewards of God's creation—everything we have first belongs to God.

Truly, our concern is for the salvation of the soul of every individual. Abortion kills unborn human beings, given to us by God <u>and</u> it kills the souls of those who have abortions performed.

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At the same time, the Church is not simply "siding" with environmentalists who tend to give more importance to the environment than to human beings. Indeed, for Orthodox Christians, the environment is not our god. Christ is our God. The environment will eventually pass away on the Day of Judgment. Therefore, by first living a sincere Orthodox Christian spiritual life, we prepare ourselves for God's Eternal Kingdom and, as a "by-product," we show respect for His

being deceived by deceivers who grow worse in their efforts to deceive, as St. Paul notes in today's passage from his Second Epistle to Timothy.

From the Apostles we learn that the work to "catch people" into the nets of our Lord's Holy Church requires a personal commitment to worship God faithfully. This translates into a daily life-style of sacrificial love for others; avoiding evil; avid study of the Holy Scriptures—and respect for the Church's teachings in order to combat falsehood. This is how the early Christians and our Saints served as *examples* of Christ-like love. As such, the Apostles became co-creators with our Lord. As Archimandrite Haralambos Vasilopoulos writes, "As Christ gave the Apostles and the first Christians the ability to be co-creators with Him, so does He give us the same ability today...He imparted to them the ability to create more Christians and those Christians created even more Christians, and so on." (What is the Purpose of Life?, pg. 37).

Our love for God is met with inspiration from God. This is what allows us to be examples of the Gospel teachings. Being examples of Christ is a life-time work—a "litourgia" (work) of the Divine Liturgy, which serves as the greatest means for teaching our people. Through the Divine Liturgy we live with Christ in the here and now. With the Entrance of the Gospel (the Small Entrance), while we proclaim the Gospel to the world, holding it high in the air, we are also present with the magi, "bowing and worshiping Christ." With the reading of the Gospel passage, the teachings of our Lord are shared with the whole world, while we ourselves are Apostles being mystically present with His first Apostles, listening to His words. During the Great Entrance when the Holy Gifts are brought in procession to the Holy Altar Table, we follow Jesus to Jerusalem; we sing "Hosanna to God in the highest," making way for Him to enter our lives, remembering us as He remembered the thief who repented, "Remember me, Lord, when You come into Your Kingdom." ("May the Lord our God remember us all in His Kingdom..."). At the same time, we are present with Christ at the Last Supper where the Lord asked His Apostles, as He asks us today, to remember Him, saying, "Do this in remembrance of Me..." In the spiritual context, Christ's remembrance of us and our remembrance of Him is actually a living remembrance – in the real presence of Christ our God, whereby Christ's presence in our lives serves to bring His presence into the lives of others in real terms. This is expressed in the prayer said during the Divine Liturgy as we prepare for Holy Communion: "...Let Your pure Body and Blood be given to us by Your mighty hand and, through us, to all Your people."

<u>Verse 1 —</u> Bless the Lord O my soul and everything within me; Bless His Holy Name.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."

Verse 2-Bless the Lord O my soul and forget not all His rewards.

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

Verse 3— The Lord prepared His throne in heaven and His Kingdom rules over all.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Kontakion Hymn for this Sunday – Prostasia ton Christianon...(A Protection of Christians unshamable; mediation with the Creator immovable. We sinners beg You: do not despise the voices of our prayers, but anticipate, since You are good, and swiftly come unto our aid as we cry out to You with faith: Hurry to intercession; and hasten to supplication, O Theotokos, Who defends at all times those who honor You.)
