BAPTISM: SACRAMENT OF LIFE

Paralysis in some way is a kind of "death" of the body. By analogy, the healing of the paralytic of today's Gospel passage symbolizes the revival of humanity and this revival is accomplished through our Savior Jesus Christ. Indeed, without union with our Savior, there is no life...we are lost, paralyzed and "dead."

Being in union with Christ our God means that we die according to worldly and lustful cares and we live according to the virtues and Commandments of

God. In this regard, the purpose of the miracles performed by our Lord, which are narrated in the Gospels (and which occur in His Name) is exactly the same as is the purpose of our very lives: to glorify God so that we can draw the world into the Kingdom of Heaven.

From the reading today from St. John's Gospel we heard about the circumstance in which Christ healed the paralytic at the Pool of Bethesda. This event symbolizes the Sacrament of Holy Baptism. This Sacrament enlivens us so that we can enliven others

THE <u>FIVE PORCHES</u> OF THE POOL OF BETHESDA — In Holy Baptism our non-baptized personhood (the "old self," paralyzed by lack of faith) dies. With the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, there are "five porches" that allow for the renewal of the individual to a vibrant, fulfilling life in Christ: 1) Love for God; 2) The human conscience that makes us accountable for our actions in loving God and others; 3) The Baptismal Font itself; 4) Martyrdom—bearing witness to God's glory, and 5) Tears of repentance.

As we live out this life-style, we remember the words of theologians, who explain the fact that, for Orthodox Christians, Baptism involves three <u>visible</u> signs: there is the performance of the Sacrament of Baptism itself; there is the "baptism by blood," i.e., martyrdom, which is not limited to martyrdom by physical death, but which includes our self sacrifice for the salvation of others, and, there is also our participation in the Sacraments of Holy Confession and Holy Communion given for the forgiveness of sins and Life Everlasting. Indeed, the Sacrament of Holy Confession is also known as the Sacrament by which we are baptized in our own tears of repentance, turning from sin and living a life of Christian virtue. throughout the world. Through Holy Baptism, Christ our God grants to us the abilities to perform small and great miracles unto salvation and the glory of God. Hieromonk Maximos the Areiorite writes, "In the end, Baptism is the fountain of life, because it imparts to us the Spirit of God." (Guide to Salvation, pg. 72).

Liturgically, we find ourselves in the season dedicated to thoughts of Baptism and Chrismation. In other words, as we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ from the dead, we participate in His death and Resurrection through Baptism. At the same time, we also receive the grace of the Holy Spirit through Chrismation. Our newness of life is granted by the Resurrection of Christ, while at the same time, our entire way of life in Christ is guided by the Holy Spirit. Understanding the implications of Baptism and Chrismation helps us to develop a mentality that is consistent with the love of God.

At the website: <u>www.pravmir.com/</u>, a website dedicated to "How to be an Orthodox Christian Today," Fr. Alexander Schmemann's words are imparted to all of us as a reminder of the life-giving mission that we all have toward each other as a Church:

"To the extent that we live 'the life in Christ,' to the same extent, Christ our God imparts to us the powers to perform small and great miracles for the salvation of others. [The central concern in] the paralytic's words to Christ are: 'I have no man.' This is truly the cry of someone who has come to know the terrible power of human selfishness, narcissism. Every man for himself! Looking out for 'number one.' All of them, all that great multitude of blind, sick, paralyzed, are all 'waiting for the troubling of the waters;' In other words, waiting for help, concern, healing, comfort. But...each waits by himself, for himself. And when the waters are troubled, each throws himself forward and forgets about others...The whole of Christianity consists of breaking through terrible walls of self-centeredness, breaking through to that love which, in the words of St. Paul, God has 'poured into our hearts.' (Rom. 5:5). That is Christianity's new, eternal commandment and the context of the entire Gospel and all of our faith."

God's Love is the energy for life. Baptism is the Sacrament of life requiring us to love one another as Christ loves us. In a certain way, we are all "Godparents" to one another, commending one another to Christ our God. We are all God's family. Another way of saying this is that we are all the people of His Great and Holy Church. +FR. THEODORE


