#### PRAYER MUST TURN TO ACTION

During the celebration of the Divine Liturgy we hear all of the beautiful petitions and prayers which involve our daily lives. Indeed, we are obligated to perform deeds that are required for our prayers to become reality! For example, when we pray for health, it means that we actively take care of our own health and we work for the care of other peoples' health.

As the Divine Liturgy continues, following the Consecration of the Holy Gifts, when they become the Precious Body

and Blood of Christ, we hear this: "Remember, Lord, those who bear fruit and do good works in Your Holy Church, and who care for the poor and send Your mercy upon us all." Parallel to this, in the Liturgy of St. Basil, we pray for the preservation of marriages and the youth; we pray for widows, orphans, those in captivity, etc.

In other words, we pray for all those about whom Christ spoke in His parable, as we heard during today's Gospel reading. However, prayer is not only a matter of words; it becomes a

THE SPIRITUAL MEANING OF THIS SUNDAY'S THEME — The foregoing two parables — especially that of the Prodigal Son — have presented to us God's extreme goodness and love. But, so that we do not put our confidence in this alone and live carelessly, thereby squandering upon sin the time given us to work out our salvation, and death suddenly snatches us away, the most divine Fathers have appointed this day's feast commemorating Christ's impartial Second Coming, through which we bring to mind that God is not only the Friend of all humanity, but also the most righteous Judge, Who recompenses to each according to his or her deeds.

It is the aim of our Saints, by bringing to mind the Day of Judgment, to rouse us from carelessness and to do the work of virtues. In addition, the theme of this Sunday is intended to move us to love and compassion for our brethren. Besides this, even on the coming Sunday of Cheesefare, which is also known as Forgiveness Sunday, we commemorate Adam's exile from Paradise --which exile is the beginning of life as we know it now. Failure to do good works is a sin, for which we need to seek forgiveness and correct ourselves accordingly. With this in mind, it is clear that today is reckoned the last of all feasts, because on

the last day of judgment, truly, everything of this world will come

Μετα που αγιαζονται τα Τιμια Δωρα και μεταβαλλονται σε Τιμιον Σωμα και Αιμα Χριστου, ακουμεν: <Μνησθητι, Κυριε, των καρποφορουντων εν ταις αγιαις Εκκλησιαις και μεμνημενων των πενητων και επι παντας ημας τα ελεη σου εξαποστειλον>. Αναλογως, στην Θ. Λειτουργιαν του Μ. Βασιλειου, προσευχομεθα για συζυγους, νεους, ορφανους, αιχμαλωτους, κ. τ.λ.

Με αλλα λογια, προσευχομεθα για ολους περι των οποιων ομιλησε ο Χριστος μας στην παραβολην Του την οποιαν ακουσαμεν κατα το αναγνωσμα της σημερινης Ευαγγελικης περικοπης. Αλλα, η προσευχη δεν γινεται μονον με τα λογια, αλλα πραγματοποιειται με τα εργα μας (με σκοπο να δοξαζωμεν τον Χριστον) και με την δυναμιν του Χριστου.

Γιατι προσευχομεθα για αλλους; Διοτι στο προσωπο του συνανθρωπου μας βλεπομεν το Προσωπον του Χριστου: <εφ οσον εποιησατε ενι τουτων των αδελφων Μου των ελαχιστων, εμοι εποιησατε>. (Ματθ. 25: 40) +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ reality by virtue of our actual efforts (with the motive of glorifying God) and by virtue of the power of Christ Himself.

As we pray during the Divine Liturgy (and in our personal prayers) for the sick, suffering, captives, etc., we are to call ourselves to action at the same time. This is *living the Liturgy*, as long as we perform our charity for the glory of God. "The Church does not ignore the needy...The acts of charity are the basis of the Judgment of God. The Orthodox Church should intensify Her efforts to assist the needy." (The Heavenly Banquet, by Fr. Emmanuel Hatzidakis, pg. 93).

Why do we pray for others? Because in the face of our fellow human being we are to see the Face of Christ: "In as much as you have done this to even the least of My brethren, you did it unto Me." (St. Matthew 25: 40). Orienting ourselves to Christ in this way helps us to chase away anger and hatred from our hearts.

Through Christ (and in Christ) we are truly brethren. The Lord said to those who were blessed: "Inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." The use of the word "inherit" means that our destiny is to be with God forever, because we are sons and daughters of God—allowed to an inheritance. Experiencing the joy of God's Kingdom begins in the here and now through worship and prayer with and for others.

Learning to pray in our thoughts throughout the day requires resolve on our part; yet, resting our daily thoughts on prayer scatters the demons of hatred, stress and anger. "If anyone harms me, I have only to think, 'How sweet is the "Jesus Prayer": 'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy upon me' and the injury and the anger alike pass away and I forget all...I thank God that I now know the meaning of those words that I heard in the Epistle reading: 'Pray without ceasing.'" [1 Thessalonians 5:17] (Way of the Pilgrim, pg. 17-18).

As much as prayer is a means to ask God to help make good things happen, it is also the means for us to listen to God speaking in our souls so that we ourselves can be the vehicles for many kinds of good deeds.


