Holy Communion Order

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

HAVE FAITH IN GOD

St. John Chrysostom explained today's Gospel passage in his 49th Homily *On the Gospel of St. Matthew (Nicene and Post-Nicene Fathers,* Vol. 10, pgs. 304-307).

St. John noted that Christ gave thanks before distributing the five loaves of bread and the two fish, because God is One God in Three Persons — Father, Son and Holy Spirit — and the Bible emphasizes that God the Father created all things in heaven and on earth (Genesis 1:

1). The Holy Spirit hovered over "the face" of the waters (Genesis 1:2). The Son of God is the source of light's energy (Genesis 1:3 and St. John 1:1-3). The pronouns "we" and "us" in Genesis 1:26 indicate that the Father, Son and Holy Spirit worked in unity in the creation of all things. Therefore, the "thanks" expressed by our Lord in the wilderness as He performed this miracle of the five loaves and two fish gives testimony to the fact that Christ is God Who *Continued on page 2*

ST. MARY MAGDALENE

Today we commemorate St. Mary Magdalene. St. Mary was from Magdala in Galilee on the Sea of Tiberias, and for this was named Magdalene. When the Lord Jesus cast out seven demons from her, from which she had been suffering, she became His faithful and inseparable disciple, following Him and ministering unto Him even to the time of His crucifixion and burial. Then, returning to Jerusalem together with the rest of the Myrrh-bearers, she prepared the fragrant spices for anointing the body of the Lord. And on the Lord's day they came very early to the tomb as the Angels appeared declaring the Resurrection of the Lord. When Mary Magdalene saw the stone taken away from the tomb, she ran and proclaimed it to Peter and John.

Returning immediately to the tomb and weeping outside, she was deemed worthy to be the first of the Myrrh-bearers to behold the Lord arisen from the dead, and when she fell at His feet, she heard Him say, "Touch Me not." After the Lord's Ascension, nothing certain is known concerning her. Some accounts say that she went to Rome and later returned to Jerusalem, and from there proceeded to Ephesus, where she ended her life, preaching Christ.

Ο Αγιος Ιωαννης ο Χρυσοστομος εξηγησε την σημερινην Ευαγγελικην περικοπην στην 49ην Ομιλιαν του περι του κατα Ματθαιον Ευαγγελιου (Γραπτα των Πατερων της Συνοδου Νικαιας και Μετα την Συνοδον της Νικαιας, Τομ.10, σελ.304–307).

Ο Αγιος Ιωαννης εσημιωσε οτι ο Χριστος ευχαριστησε τον Θεον Πατεραν πριν διαμεινει τους πεντε αρτους και τα δυο ψαρια, διοτι, ο Θεος ειναι Ενας Θεος με Τρια Προσωπα- Πατηρ, Υιος και Αγιο Πνευμα – και η Αγια Γραφη τονιζει οτι ο Πατηρ εδημιουργησε τους ουρανους και την γην (Γεν.1:1). Το Αγιο Πνευμα εκυλουσε επανω <στο προσωπο> του υδατος (Γεν.1:2). Ο Υιος του Θεου ειναι η αρχη του φωτος (Γεν.1:3 και Ιωαν. 1:1-3). Οι αντωνυμοι <εμεις> και <μας> στην Γεν. 1:26 δειχνουν οτι ο Πατηρ, ο Υιος και το Αγιο Πνευμα εργασθηκαν ενωμενοι στην πραξη της δημιουργιας. Λοιπον, το <ευχαρισω> που εκφρασε ο Ιησους ειναι αποδειξις οτι ο Χριστος ειναι Θεος ο Οποιος ειπε οτι ολη η δημιουργια ειναι καλη (Γεν. 1).

Ο Αγιος Ιωαννης, συνεπως, ετονισε οτι πρεπει να ειμεθα ευγνωμονες για ολα που στερεωνουν την πνευματικην και την σωματικην μας ζωην. Καθως αγαπαμε τον Θεον, ας αγαπησουμεν τα πνευματικα χαρισματα του Θεου ωστε να μπορουμεν επισης να δεχθουμεν και να χρησιμοποιησουμεν τα υλικα αγαθα του Θεου προς δοξαν του Θεου.

Το ελέος του Θεου ειναι δωρον για εμας ωστε να το μοιραστουμεν με αλλους ωστε ολοι να γνωρισουν την αγαπην του Θεου. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

said that all of creation "is good." (Genesis, Chapter 1).

St. John, therefore, emphasized that we must be grateful for all things that support our spiritual and physical lives. As we love God, let us love the spiritual gifts that God gives us so that we can also use His material blessings for His glory. The mercy of God is a gift for us to share with others so that they can know the love of God. This is what *is good!*

The theologians of the *Orthodox Study Bible* note that, collectively, the Saints of our Church understand the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand with five loaves of bread as an image of the Divine Liturgy. They also consider that the gathering of the leftover fragments by the Apostles "shows that the teachings that the faithful are unable to grasp are nevertheless held in the consciousness of the Church." (pg. 1295).

The tremendous importance of giving thanks to God for all of the spiritual and physical benefits that we have is verified by our Church in the fact that there is an entire Church Service, which is included in the celebration of the Divine Liturgy, which verbalizes for us our expressions of thanksgiving to God. It is the Service of the "Artoklasia" (The Blessing of the Five Loaves). This Service is usually held following the final Prayer of the Liturgy that is said before the Icon of Christ following Holy Communion (known as the "Opisthavonon Efhee"). It begins with petitions for the health and salvation for any who are enduring personal spiritual and physical suffering, as well as for all the parishioners of the community. A long intercessory prayer follows, asking that our Lord, through the prayers of the Mother of God and all the Saints, extend His mercy upon all people. A hymn to the Mother of God is then chanted, indicating that She is the Chief Intercessor for all of humanity in that She gave birth to Christ our Savior. Finally, a hymn quoting the words of Psalm 34:11 is chanted: "Wealthy people have become impoverished and have hungered; but, those who seek the Lord shall not lack any good thing."

The hymn explains the miracle of the feeding of the multitudes by Christ our God. As the multitudes sought Christ in the wilderness, staying even to a late hour, we too are to seek Christ. As the multitudes were fed, we too are fed through Holy Communion and every other blessings in our lives. Those who depend only on material wealth will go hungry, because, without God, all things go out of existence. This miracle makes tangible the words of our Lord, "Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness." (St. Matthew 6:33). +FR. THEODORE

ANTIPHON I: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou..." (By the prayers of the Theotokos...)

Verse 1 – Bless the Lord, O my soul, and everything within me; bless His holy name.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."

<u>Verse 2-</u>Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His rewards.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas.

<u>Verse 3 — The Lord prepared His throne in heaven and His Kingdom rules over all.</u>

Refrain: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Refrain: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson

ANTIPHON II: "Soson imas Ie Theou..." (Save us, O Son of God...)

<u>Verse 1-</u>Praise the Lord, O my soul! I shall praise the Lord while I live; I shall sing to my God as long as I exist.

Refrain: "Soson imas Ie Theou, O Anastas ek nekron,, psallontas si alleluia."

Verse 2 -Blessed is he whose help is the God of Jacob; his hope is in the Lord his God.

Refrain: "Save us, O Son of God, Who arose from the dead, we sing to You, Alleluia."

Verse 3 - The Lord shall reign forever; your God, O Zion, to all generations.

Refrain: "Soson imas Ie Theou, O Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si alleluia."

<u>Doxa Patri ke Yio ke Aghio Pnevmati ke nin ke aei ke eis tous aonas ton aonon. Amin.</u> "O Monogenis Yios ke Logos tou Theou…"

ANTIPHON III-

This is the day the Lord made; let us greatly rejoice and be glad therein.

<u>Sunday Hymn</u>: Katelisas to Stavro Sou ton thanaton...[Tone 7] (O Lord by Your sacred Cross You abolished death and granted unto the thief blessed paradise. The Myrrh-bearers ceased lamenting and turned to joy. The Apostles did preach the good news at Your command that You had risen from the dead, O Christ our God, bestowing Your mercy upon the world evermore.)

<u>Hymn for St. Mary Magdalene</u>: Chisto to dhee imas ek Parthenou techthendi ...(You followed Christ the Lord, who was born of the Virgin for us, and kept His laws, and you lived by His statutes; and thus as we celebrate your allholy memorial, Mary Magdalene, today with faith we extol you, O most blessed Saint, and with divine love and longing we honor your memory.)

<u>Hymn for St. George</u>: Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis... (Since you are a deliverer of captives and a defender of the poor; a physician for the sick and a noble attendant to kings, O Great among the Martyrs and Glorious George, intercede with Christ God that He may save our souls.)

<u>Sunday Kontakion Hymn</u>: Prostasia ton Christianon...(A Protection of Christians unshamable; mediation with the Creator immovable. We sinners beg You: do not despise the voices of our prayers, but anticipate, since You are good, and swiftly come unto our aid as we cry out to You with faith: Hurry to intercession; and hasten to supplication, O Theotokos, Who defends at all times those who honor You.)
