Holy Communion Order

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers
- Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

GOOD PEOPLE & GOOD DEEDS

As in science or math, spiritual life has its axioms, too: 1) good people do good deeds; 2) good people are those who have a relationship with God Who *alone* is Good; 3) God's goodness is a lasting goodness and is not temporary. It is prayer that develops our relationship in God's Love and God's Will for all people to partake in His Eternal Life.

Axioms are a statement of truth. With regard to the Orthodox Christian lifestyle, the axioms about good people - i.e., the Saints - take their beginning

from the way of life of the Holy Apostles, who, as "good people" performed the good works of God.

In commemorating St. Gregory Palamas today, we are reminded of this Holy Tradition of the Church, since he was so valiant in defending it during his life time in the 14th Century. He defended the truth about the relationship between prayer and the human participation in the uncreated energies of God.

By "prayer," St. Gregory spoke of the

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THE MESSAGE OF THE SUNDAY OF THE PARALYTIC

"As shown by the healing of the Paralytic, **faith** is an indispensable condition for salvation. Faith is collective as well as personal, for the faith of the paralytic's friends helped in his healing (vs. 2). Three signs of Jesus' divinity are shown: 1) He knows the secrets of hearts (1 Kings 16:7); 2) He forgives sins, a power which belongs to God alone; and 3) He heals by the power of His word.

Note that the purpose of Christ coming into the world is to **forgive sins**, freeing humanity from its bondage. Forgiving sins is a greater power than physical healing, for, as the scribes correctly noted, **God alone** can forgive sins (vs. 7). Therefore, the **easier** task (vs. 9) is to grant physical healing. Though Christ is fully God and holds the authority to forgive, He condescends to those gathered and heals this man in order to draw people to God, Whom they **glorified.**" —See *Orthodox Study Bible*, pages 1283 and 1332)

All of the miracles performed by our Savior inspired people to give glory to God. They did not express pride for having any special privilege.

Γρηγοριον τον Παλαμα σημερα, υπενθυμιζουμεν τον εαυτον μας περι της Αγιας Παραδοσεως της Εκκλησιας μας, αφου ηταν ο ιδιος τοσο αφοσιωμένος προς την υπέρασπισην της Ορθοδοξιας στην εποχην του. Εδιδασκε την αληθειαν περι της σχεσεως μεταξυ της προσευχης και την ανθρωπινην συμμετοχην στις ακτιστες ενεργειες του Θεου. Ο Αγ. prayer of the heart—inner prayer—that is, "silent" prayer ("silence," in Greek is hisychia—hence, the word, hesychasm). With the Name of Jesus Christ constantly in our minds and thoughts, we have the means by which temptations are extinguished and evil imaginations are destroyed. The prayer "of the Name" is called "The Jesus Prayer," and it is: "O Lord, Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner."

Through unceasing prayer, we thus allow Christ to enter our thoughts and illumine our souls, and we stand able to experience the uncreated energies of Christ as did the Saints of the Church. The Saints proved to be co-workers with our Lord in the working of miracles for the glory of God and the salvation of others. The uncreated energies of God are comprehended in the Uncreated Light of Christ, as was experienced by the Apostles at the event of His Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor. Our Savior told His Apostles and followers: "You are the light of the world." (St. Matthew 5:14). However, this "light" is, in fact, the Light of Christ, Who is the True Light.

In this message of our Lord, the use of candles became a part of our Holy Apostolic Tradition. The candle is used at our Baptisms to represent that we are the "light" of the world from The True Light of the world - Christ. This candle is our Easter candle; our wedding candles; the candles that we light upon entering church. The "theology" of the candle is consistent with St. Gregory Palamas' defense of our Faith. An unlit candle is the image of something "paralyzed" - paralyzed, like the paralytic in today's Gospel. Upon being "lit" by Christ in Baptism, His Light is now in us and we carry His Light to all that we meet. Light is great energy. Once our souls are "on fire" with Christ, we can produce eternally good works. The candle is an analogy of our Orthodox spiritual teaching. The wick carries the flame, like our souls burn with the Light of Christ. The candle "sacrifices itself," like we are to give of ourselves in order to illumine those around us. Like the candle gives heat, we are to warm people's hearts. Good things happen when the candle is lit, just like good things are done by good people.

The candle also is an image of the Trinity: One God (a single flame) in Three Persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit (light, heat and energy). This is the candle of the Sacraments: Baptism, Marriage, Unction, and the Liturgy. It is the candle celebrating of our Lord's Resurrection. We see this candle now during Great Lent in the Presanctified Liturgy as the priest exclaims: "The Light of Christ, illumines all!"

<u>Hymn for this Sunday</u>: Orthodoxias o Fostir...(Beacon of Orthodox belief, the strong support of the Church and her teacher inspired by God, you are the ornament of monks, the unassailable champion of theologians, O Gregory the Wonder-worker and the boast of Thessalonica, the messenger of grace. Forever earnestly entreat for the salvation of our souls.)

<u>Hymn for St. George</u>: Os ton ehmaloton eleftherotis... (As the one who sets the captives free and the protector of the poor; as physician to the sick and champion defender of kings, bearer of trophies are you. O great martyr George, intercede with Christ our God that He may save our souls.)

<u>Kontakion Hymn</u>: Ti Ypermacho...(O Champion General, I your City now ascribe to you triumphant anthems as the tokens of my gratitude, being rescued from the terrors, O Theotokos. Inasmuch as you have power unassailable, from all kinds of perils free me so that unto you I may cry aloud: Rejoice, O unwedded Bride.)


