Holy Communion Order

- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- 2. Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

THE OIL AND THE WINE

We can understand our Lord's Parable of the Good Samaritan in the context of our unity with Christ our God. Christ is the Good Samaritan. We are the wounded travelers, who are cared for by the Good Samaritan in His "Inn," which is the Church. As members of His Church, we are "innkeepers," who help in bringing about the full recovery of others who are wounded in their travels through life. In doing so, each of us, like our Savior becomes a Good Samaritan.

Something must be said, however, about the medicines used to cure the wounded traveler so that he could be brought to the inn and be made well for the purpose of himself becoming a Good Samaritan. These medicines are *forgiveness* and *repentance* - the "oil" and the "wine" that the Good Samaritan poured over the wounds of the traveler.

Application of these medicines require the exposure of the wounds

Με αυτον τον τροπον, ο καθενας απο εμας, οπως ειναι ο Κυριος, γινεται καλος Σαμαρειτης.

Ωστοσο, πρεπει να ειπουμε κατι σχετικα με τα φαρμακα που χρησιμοποιουνται για την θεραπειαν του πληγωμενου ταξιδιωτη ετσι ωστε να γινη και αυτος καλος Σαμαρειτης. Αυτα τα φαρμακα ειναι η συγχωρησις και η μετανοια... δηλαδη, <το λαδι> και <το κρασι> που ο Καλος Σαμαρειτης εριξε επανω στις πληγες του τραυματιμενου. Η εφαρμογη αυτων των φαρμακων απαιτει την εκθεσην αυτων των πληγων, αναγνωριζοντας την υπαρξην των και των πονων των. Λαμβανοντας αυτο υποψην, ξωδιπλωνεται σε αυτην την Παραβολην μια εικονα της Αγιας Εξομολογησεως.

Το πρωτο βημα προς την θεραπεια ειναι να επιτρεψουμεν τον Καλον Σαμαρειτην να ειδει τις πληγες—με αλλα λογια, να εξομολογησουμεν τις αμαρτιες μας με θλιψη και με ειλικρινειαν. Το δευτερο βημα ειναι να κανουμεν ασκηση που απαιτειται για την μετανοιαν.

Ο καθενας απο εμας εχουμεν αναγκη απο <το λαδι> και <το κρασι> τα οποια ειναι η συγχωρησις και η μετανοια για την σωτηριαν μας. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ that need to be treated. Taking this into account, we see unfolding in this Parable an image of the Sacrament of Holy Confession.

According to this Parable, the traveler on the road to Jericho was overcome by robbers. The Saints commonly view "the robbers" as the demons who attack us throughout our road in life with temptations and deceptions. They beat us up with fantasies and assumptions that too often have nothing to do with reality. Hence, the fantasies and assumptions that are caused by temptations and deceptions cause stress and anxiety, which, in turn, take a toll on the health of our bodies, while, at the same time leading us to commit sin, taking a toll on the health of our souls.

The wounds that need bandaging are the sins that we commit as a result of the deceptions and temptations brought on by demons. From the time of Adam and Eve, deceptions and temptations have been the main ingredients behind sins. Yet, another deception that is thrown at us by demons is that each one of us feels embarrassed for our sins, not because we committed them, but because we think that we are the only ones who commit sins, while everyone around us goes without sinning. Again, this is a deception. Everyone without exception, is in need of cure; in need of forgiveness and repentance.

The first step to cure is to allow the Good Samaritan to see the wounds - that is, to confess our sins with sorrow and contrition. Strictly speaking, a sin consists of motives, words and deeds that are clearly devoid of love for *both* Christ our God *and* our neighbor. Having sinned, our souls are bruised. Forgiveness from our Lord *is* the oil that soothes our souls. But, forgiveness can be applied only when it is sought.

Seeking forgiveness is effort. This effort requires everything from simply correcting a mishap to subjecting one's self to some therapy in order to deal with issues that draw them into behaviors that constantly harm themselves and others. This effort is the "wine" - that antiseptic that stings by cleaning out the impurities of the wound. This is the effort that is required for repentance, which is the complete "change of mind" that gives way to voluntarily rejecting sinful ideas and ways in favor of being at peace with God.

Every one of us is in need of "oil" and "wine," though many refuse to acknowledge it, living out their lives in denial.

Let us all stop kidding ourselves and enjoy the oil *and* the wine of forgiveness and repentance so that, together, our Church can remain a vibrant force for the healing of our society in general.

Encyclical for Veterans Day 2018

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord,

On Sunday November 11, our nation will celebrate Veterans Day, honoring all living men and women that have served and serve today in all the branches of the military. They courageously serve our nation, ready to answer the call to go into harm's way in foreign lands to defend our nation and its values. I hope that each parish of our Metropolis will find a way to honor those in the parish who have served in the past and serve today so that each member of the community may offer the simple words, "Thank you for your service."

While those in military service are trained for war, they pray for peace more fervently because they know the brutality and destruction that war causes and scars our world. We should join them in praying for peaceful times, echoing the words of the prophet Micah who prophesied a time when we shall beat "swords into plowshares," "spears into pruning hooks," and "nation shall not lift up sword against nation" (Micah: 3:3-4). Let us not forget that in many of our liturgical services, we pray for those in the military and ask God to protect all of us from armed invasions.

Our Lord Jesus Christ calls us to be peacemakers, saying, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons of God." (Matthew 5:9). Saint Gregory of Nyssa says that a peacemaker is one who works to "cast out hatred and abolish war, to exterminate envy and banish strife, to take away hypocrisy and extinguish from within resentment of injuries smoldering in the heart." (On the Lord's Prayer and Beatitudes). The saint is challenging us to work at the causes of war itself, the dispositions that dwell within each of us that could lead us to violence. The saint is challenging us to become active in the world as peacemakers so that "justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an everflowing stream" (Amos 5:24).

This year, we celebrate Veterans Day on the one hundredth anniversary of the end of World War I. Nearly 20 million people died — military and civilian — in a conflict that lasted four years, and ended in stalemate. In the aftermath, the world was changed dramatically: empires fell, new nations were created. Our ancestral homelands — in Greece, Anatolia and the Balkans — were also dramatically affected, through political upheaval and population exchanges. Our Ecumenical Patriarchate was also affected and today it still lives under conditions imposed at that time. Today, we can trace the origins of many of the world's greatest challenges to that terrible war and its aftermath. In our prayers this Sunday, let us remember those who perished in that "great" war, beseeching Almighty God to give them rest "in a place of light, in a place of green pasture, in a place of refreshment, from where pain, sorrow, and sighing have fled away."

May the God of peace and justice guide you always.

Volunteer by signing the "Volunteer Sign-Up Sheet" posted on the bulletin board in the parish hall.




