#### HOSANNA! REJOICE IN THE LORD!

Today Jesus enters Jerusalem so that He can be with us through everything that we endure every day in our lives. As Christ is with us, we are to be with Him in His passion and to find ourselves with Him at the Resurrection. The icon of today's feast day teaches us a lot.

Historically, the Palm Sunday Icon appeared in the Orthodox Church for the first time during the fourth century. According to the Holy Tradition of our Church, the icon depicts Christ on "the colt of a donkey", as the Prophet Zacharias prophesied (Zacharias 9:9). There

are two important mountains in Christ's ministry: Mt. Tabor, where Jesus was transfigured, revealing His Divinity 40 days prior to His crucifixion, and the Mount of Olives, where Jesus frequently went to pray and from where He voluntarily entered into the city of Jerusalem. Opposite the Mount of Olives, as we see the icon, we recognize the city walls of Jerusalem and this shows that, in Christ, Heaven and earth are joined together. #### PRAYER FOR THE BLESSING OF PALMS ON PALM SUNDAY

Deacon: Let us pray to the Lord.

Choir: Lord, Have mercy.

Priest: O Lord our God, Who rests upon the Cherubim and has reaffirmed Your power and sent forth Your Only-Begotten Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, to save the world through His Cross, Burial and Resurrection: Who when He drew near to Jerusalem for His voluntary Passion, the people that sat in darkness and the shadow of death took as tokens of victory boughs of trees and branches of palms, thus foretelling His Resurrection. Do You Yourself, O Master and Lord, keep and preserve us also, who, following their example, on the pre-feast of that day, we carry in our hands palms and branches, and who, like the crowds and children cry out unto You, saying: "Hasanna!" That with hymns and spiritual songs we may be accounted worthy to attain the life-giving Resurrection on the third day: in Jesus Christ our Lord, with Whom You are blessed, together with Your All-Holy, Good and Life-giving Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages.

Σήμερα εισέρχεται ο Ιησούς στην Ιερουσαλήμ γιά να περάση μαζί μας όλα όσα υπομένουμεν κάθε ημέρα στην ζωήν μας. Ομως, εμείς από σήμερα, θα περάσουμεν μαζί Του τα πάθη και θα βρεθούμεν μαζί Του στην Ανάστασιν.

Ιστορικώς, η εικόνα της Κυριακής των Βαΐων επαρουσιάσθηκε στην Εκκλησίαν γιά πρώτη φορά κατά την-διάρκειαν του τετάρτου αιώνος. Σύμφωρα με την Ιεράν Παράδοσιν της Εκκλησίας, η εικόνα δείχνει τον Χριστόν <έπί πώλον όνου> όπως επροφήτευσε ο Προφήτης Ζαχαρίας (Ζαχ. 9:9). Παρηστάνεται ένα βουνό στην εικόναν το οποίο είναι το Ορος των Ελαιών όπου ο Χριστός επροσευχόταν συχνά, και από όπου εισήλθε εθελοντικά στην Ιερουσαλήμ. Απέναντι, καθώς βλέπομεν την εικόνα, τα τείχη της πόλεως της Ιερουσαλήμ απεικονίζονται και αυτό δείχνει ότι στον Χριστόν, ο ουρανός και η γη συγχωρεύονται. Ανάμεσα στο Όρος των Ελαιών και την πόλιν είναι τα φοινίκα με ένα παιδί το οποίο κόβει ένα κλαδί γιά να υποδεχθεί τον Ιησούν ως Βασιλεύς. Τα παιδιά έστρωσαν τα ιμάτιά των, καθώς έκραξαν το <Ωσαννά!> Ομως, οι πατέρες τους διεμέρησαν τα ιμάτια του Χριστού καθώς εφώναξαν το <σταύρωσον Αὐτόν!> Εζήτησαν την σταύρωσην του Χριστού, επειδή δεν έμειναν ευχαριστημένοι από όλα που ο Χριστός έκανε γιά να γνωρίσουν την πραγματικήν Θεϊκήν αγάπην Too.

Ας έχουμεν εμείς φλογερήν αγάπην και σταθεράν πίστιν, έτσι ώστε γα μπορέσουμεν να υποδεχθούμεν τον Χριστόν στις ψυχές μας από σήμερα και εις το εξής.

"Christ...bridges the gap between the Mountain of God and the city of man." (pg. 130). Between the Mount of Olives and the city of Jerusalem there is a palm tree with a young boy cutting down a palm branch in order to welcome Jesus as King. The children are "prefigures" of the "catechumens" who grow from spiritual childishness to spiritual maturity. Ideally, we should want to see ourselves in their company as we grow in faith.

To the one side of the icon, the Disciples are depicted; they will later abandon Jesus. On the other side, the citizens of Jerusalem are depicted—among them, the Pharisees who would convince them to call for His crucifixion. Children are seen spreading garments along Jesus' path—much like a "red carpet". The innocent children welcome Him with "Hosanna in the highest…" Their fathers will divide Christ's garments among themselves at the crucifixion after rejecting Him with "Crucify Him…"

"Crucify Him?" These people were so very ungrateful to our Savior, although, in fact, they had much for which to be grateful. He healed their sick and raised the dead. He gave them peace of soul through sound teachings for a joyful way of life. All they had to do was to glorify God. Let us, unlike the Pharisees who called for the crucifixion of our Lord, be grateful to God for His infinite love by which He gives us eternal life. We know *gratitude* as The Eucharist (the Divine Liturgy), which is to be lived as a daily life-style, with Christ our God dwelling in our souls.

Holy Week is a week dedicated to training us to direct our minds toward living every day with Christ our God in our midst. St. Paul explains the world-view of those living the life of gratitude to God: "Rejoice in the Lord always; I say rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and supplication, with all thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the God of peace, Who transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus...Whatever is true; whatever is noble; whatever is right; whatever is pure; whatever is lovely; whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things." (Philippians 4: 4-8).

"A great multitude that had come to the feast, when they heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, took branches of palm trees and went out to meet Him and cried out: 'Hasanna! Blessed is He Who comes in the Name of the Lord! King of Israel!' Then Jesus, when He had found a young donkey, sat on it, as it is written, 'Fear not, daughter of Zion: Behold, your King is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt.' His disciples did not understand these things at first; then they remembered that these things were written about Him and that they had done these things to Him. The people with Him when He called Lazarus out of his tomb and raised him from the dead, bore witness." - St. John 12: 12-16

Response: "Tes presvies tis Theotokou, Soter, soson imas."

Chanter(s): Glory to the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, both now and forever and to the ages of ages. Amen.

Response: "By the prayers of the Theotokos, Savior, save us."

#### **ANTIPHON II:**

<u>Verse 1:</u> I believed; therefore, I spoke; I was greatly humbled. To the saints on His earth, in them the Lord magnified all His will.

Response: "Soson imas Ie Theou, o epi pollou ohnou kathestheis, psallontas si: Allilouia."

Verse 2: I will take up the cup of salvation, and call upon the name of the Lord.

Response: Save us, O Son of God, Who sat upon a donkey's colt, we sing to You: Alleluia.

<u>Verse 3:</u> I shall pay my vows to the Lord in the presence of all His people.

Response: "Soson imas Ie Theou, o epi pollou ohnou kathestheis, psallontas si: Allilouia."

Chanter(s): "Doxa Patri ke Io, ke Ayio Pnevmati, ke nin ke ai ke is tous eonas ton eonon. Amin."

People: O Monogenis Ios ke Logos tou Theou... (O Only-Begotten Son and Word of God...)

ANTIPHON III: Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endures forever. Let the house of Israel say that He is good, for His mercy endures forever. Let the house of Aaron say that He is good, for His mercy endures forever. Let all who fear the Lord say that He is good, for His mercy endures forever.

<u>Sunday Resurrection Hymn</u>: Tin Kineen Anastasin...(To confirm the general Resurrection before Your Passion, You resurrected Lazarus from the dead, O Christ our God. Therefore, imitating the children carrying the symbols of victory, we cry out to You, the Victor over death: "Hasanna in the highest! Blessed are You, the One, Who comes in the Name of the Lord.)

At the Entrance with the Gospel: <u>Evloghimenos o Erchomenos...o epi polou onou kathesthis</u>... (Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. God is the Lord, and He revealed Himself to us. Save us, O Son of God, who sat on a donkey's colt, as we sing to You, Allelouia)

Repeat the Hymn, "Tin Kineen Anastasin," followed by the <u>Special Hymn for this day:</u> Syntafendes Soi dhia tou vaptismatos...(We were buried with You through Baptism, O Christ our God, and thus by Your Resurrection we have been granted immortal life, and extolling You we cry aloud, "Hosanna in the highest! Blessed are You the One Who comes in the Name of the Lord.)

Kontakion Hymn: To throno en ourano, to polo epi tis ghees...(In heaven upon the throne, on earth upon the colt, You were carried, O Christ our God; a;nd the praise of Angels and the hymns of the children You received as they cried out to You: "Blessed are You, Who is coming to call Adam back again.)

READINGS: Epistle: Philippians 4:4-9 / Gospel: St. John 12:1-18

The Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom is celebrated.

Instead of "Axion Estin," Theos Kyrios kai epephanen imeen"...(God is the Lord, and He appeared to us. O Christians, appoint a feast, and with exultant joy come and let us magnify the Christ, waving our palm-leaves and branches, crying aloud in hymns: "Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord our Savior.)

<u>Communion Hymn</u>: Evloghimenos o Erchomenos en onomati Kyriou...(Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Alleluia.)




