- Please remain standing while following the directions of our ushers.
- 2. Ladies, kindly remove lipstick before receiving.
- 3. When receiving Holy Communion, make the Sign of the Cross, state your name (baptismal name), and naturally receive as if being fed.
- 4. Non-Orthodox Christians may not receive Holy Communion, but they may receive the Holy Bread at the end of the service.
- 5. All Orthodox Christians must be spiritually prepared to receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Please see the priest if you have any questions.

A FULFILLED LIFE

In his article, "How to Read the Bible," Metropolitan Kallistos Ware calls our attention to the *experience* of the Bible and points to the words of St. Tikhon of Russia, "'Christ Himself is speaking to me.' Scripture is a direct, intimate dialogue between the Savior and myself — Christ addressing me, and my heart responding." (Orthodox Study Bible, pg. 1764). We often reflect on our spiritual experiences as we remember times when Christ has enlightened us and blessed us in moments of Bible study, prayer and worship.

Experiencing God's blessings comes in a variety of forms unique to each individual. In the case of the Apostles and St. Paul, the love of God was experienced first-hand. In the case of most of the Saints, Christ's love was experienced in "less than first-hand" ways. Through study of the Bible, prayer and worship, we also experience our Lord's blessings as a reality. Indeed, the Holy Spirit is greatly involved in human lives at all times and in all places.

Such experiences give emphasis to our purpose in life. For us to fulfill our *Continued on page 2*

ST. PAUL AND THE "GOLDEN RULE"— For St. Paul, blessing others by preaching the Good News of our Savior was more important than popularity or "creature-comforts." His ministry was for the benefit of *all* people for all times. Although he condemned sinful practices, as in 1 Corinthians, Chapters 5 and 6, he still was able to define the virtue of love in Chapter 13 and he applied this virtue to everyone around him, even to those who mistreated him: "When we are cursed, we bless; when persecuted, we endure; when slandered, we answer with gentleness." (1 Corinthians 4:12). St. Paul held no grudges; he always showed love, knowing that our Savior's love conquers all evil—and with the love of God, he rose above every hardship: "We are persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed." (2 Corinthians 4:9). His purpose in life was to bless others from his own blessings, giving flesh to the words of the Liturgy, "Thine of Thine own…" God's blessings to us are to be our blessings for God.

In all of this, the "Golden Rule" is made manifest as a life-style. "The 'Golden Rule' is a minimum of Christian virtue, as it places man's desire for goodness as a basic standard of how to treat others. It is the first step on the path to the perfection of virtue...where God's mercy, rather than man's desire is the standard." (Orthodox Study Bible, pg. 1376). +FR. THEODORE

Στο άρθρο του, <Πως Πρέπει να Διαβάζουμεν την Αγίαν Γραφήν,> ο Μητροπολίτης Κάλλιστος Ware μας υπενθυμίζει στι η μελέτη της Αγίας Γραφής πρέπει να είναι γιά εμάς μιά <πνευματική εμπειρία,> σύμφωνα με τις σκέψεις του Αγίου Τίκονα της Ρωσίας: <Ο Ιδιος ο Χριστός ομιλεί σε εμένα. Η Αγία Γραφή είναι μιά άμεση, οικεία επικοινωνία μεταξύ του Σωτήρος και του εαυτού μας.> (Orthodox Study Bible, σελ.1764).

Συχνά σκεπτόμεθα τις πνευματικές εμπειρίες μας καθώς θυμούμεθα ότι ο Χριστός μας εφώτισε και μας ευλόγησε σε στιγμές μελέτης της Αγίας Γραφής, προσευχής, η/και λατρειάς. Τέτοιες εμπειρίες τονίζουν τον σκοπόν της ζωής μας. Γιά να εκπληρώσουμεν τον σκοπόν μας, δεν θα αποφύγουμεν τον πνευματικόν αγώνα. Ο πνευματικός αγώνας περιλαμβάνει την προσοχήν μας σχετικώς με τις σκέψεις και τις πράξεις μας. Το να είμεθα στις σκέψεις και στις πράξεις μας <είς όμοίωσην> του Θεού είναι η εκπλήρωσις της φύσεώς μας, αφού ο άνθρωπος είναι πλασμένος <ώς είκονα> του Θεού.

Ο πνευματικός αγώνας βασίζεται στην αγάπην μας γιά τον Θεόν, γνωρίζοντας ότι < Η ἀγάπη εἶναι ἐκ Θεοῦ.> (1 Ιωαν. 4:7). Προσφέρον—τας τον εαυτόν μας προς δόξαν του Θεού εκφράζουμεν τον απόλυτον σκοπόν της ζωής μας — <ἐαυτούς καί ἀλλήλους καί πᾶσαν τήν ζωήν ἡμῶν Χριστῷ τῷ Θεῷ παραθώ—μεθα.>

Μοιράζοντας την αγάπην του Θεού, οι σχέσεις μας παίρνουν θεἵκές ιδιότητες. Ας επιδιώκουμεν τις <ἐν Χριστῷ> σχέσεις μεταξύ μας! +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

purpose in life, we will never escape the need to engage in spiritual warfare. Spiritual warfare involves careful watch 'over our thoughts and deeds. When our thoughts are based on God's Word and our actions resemble God's mercy, we acquire the *likeness of God*, which is the genuine fulfillment of our nature, since we are created in the *image of God*.

It would seem as though St. Paul would define human life to be more than "a comfortable existence in the present." Instead, "an eternal presence of the human person before Christ" would be a more accurate understanding of his definition of human life. As Orthodox Christians, we strive to be in the presence of Christ now and into eternity. To be in the presence of Christ, however, is not just to please ourselves. Our presence with Christ in our midst is a matter of bringing others, as well, into the presence of our Lord.

For St. Paul, spiritual warfare involved dealing with his own inner weaknesses, as well as his outward circumstances of hardship. At the same time, he experienced the power of our Lord's love, through which he always had the ability to preach the Gospel. To the Corinthians he wrote, "We are...persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed --always carrying in the body the dying of the Lord Jesus, that the life of Jesus may be manifested in our body...For it is all for your sake, so that as grace extends to more and more people it may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God." (2 Corinthians 4: 8-9 & 16). Offering one's self for God's glory is indeed the ultimate fulfillment in life -- "...let us commit ourselves and one another and our whole life to Christ our God."

In sharing God's love, our relationships take on Divine qualities. "God is love (I John 4:16), and is revealed as personal communion, in a person-to-person relationship...for, where two mortals meet, it is the Divinity of which one tastes. For, 'Where two or three are gathered in My Name, I am there among them' (Matt. 18:20).'" (The Way of the Fathers; Exploring the Patristic Mind, by Fr. John Chryssavgis, pg. 81).

Let us seek Christ-centered relationships with each other and our youth, as Sunday School now begins -- and let us teach *by example*. +FR. THEODORE

ANTIPHON II: "Soson imas Ie Theou..." (Save us, O Son of God...)

Verse 1- Praise the Lord, O my soul! I shall praise the Lord while I live; I shall sing to my God as long as I exist. Refrain: "Soson imas Ie Theou, O Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si alleluia."

Verse 2 – Blessed is he whose help is the God of Jacob; his hope is in the Lord his God.

Refrain: "Save us, O Son of God, Who Arose from the dead; we sing to You, Alleluia."

Verse 3 - The Lord shall reign forever; your God, O Zion, to all generations.

Refrain: "Soson imas Ie Theou, O Anastas ek nekron, psallontas si alleluia."

Hymn for St. Kyriakos: Tis erheemou politis... (As a citizen of the desert and an angel incarnate and a wonderworker you shone forth, O Kyriacos, our God-bearing father. Since you received the spiritual gifts by fasting and vigilance and prayer, you can cure those who are ailing and heal the souls of those who run to you with faith. Glory to Him who gave His might to you; glory to Him who placed a crown on you; glory to Him who operates through you, providing cures to all.)



EPISTLE- 2 Corinthians 4:6-15

Brethren, it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, to show that the transcendent power belongs to God and not to us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our bodies. For while we live we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be manifested in our mortal flesh. So death is at work in us, but life in you. Since we have the same spirit of faith as he had who wrote, "I believed, and so I spoke," we too believed, and so we speak, knowing that He who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and bring us with you into His presence. For it is

all for your sake, so that as grace extends to more and more people it may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

GOSPEL-St. Luke 6: 31-36

The Lord said, "And as you wish that men would do to you, do so to them. If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even sinners lend to sinners, to receive as much again. But love your enemies, and do good, and lend, expecting nothing in return; and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High; for he is kind to the ungrateful and the selfish. Be merciful, even as your Father is merciful."
