## PRAYER FOR READING HOLY SCRIPTURES

EPISTLE—1 Corinthians 9:2-12

Brethren, you are the seal of my apostleship in The Lord said this parable: "The kingdom of the Lord. This is my defense to those who would examine me. Do we not have the right to our food and drink? Do we not have the right to be accompanied by a wife, as the other apostles and the brothers of the Lord and Cephas? Or is it only Barnabas and I who have no right to refrain from working for a living? Who serves as a soldier at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard without eating any of its fruit? Who tends a flock without getting some of the milk? Do I say this on human authority? Does not the law say the same? For it is written in the law of Moses, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it is treading out the grain." Is it for oxen that God is concerned? Does he not speak entirely for our sake? It was written for our sake, because the plowman should plow in hope and the thresher thresh in hope of a share in the crop. If we have sown spiritual good among you, is it too much if we reap your material benefits? If others share this rightful claim upon you, do not we still more? Nevertheless, we have not made use of this right, but we endure anything rather than put an obstacle in the way of the gospel of Christ.

GOSPEL-St. Matthew 18: 23-35

heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. When he began the reckoning, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents; and as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him the lord of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. But that same servant, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat he said, 'Pay what you owe.' So his fellow servant fell down and besought him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' He refused and went and put him in prison till he should pay the debt. When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you besought me; and should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord delivered him to the jailors, till he should pay all his debt. So also my heavenly Father will do to everyone of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

Liturgical Notes for Today

- 3. "Since you are a deliverer of captives..." [Hymn of St. George]/Ως των αιχμαλώτων ελευθερωτής...
- **4. Kontakion**: "Neither the grave nor death could contain the Theotokos, the unshakable hope, ever vigilant in intercession and protection. As Mother of life, He Who dwelt in the Ever-virginal womb transposed Her to life."/Την εν πρεσβείαις ακοίμητον Θεοτόκον...

## FORGIVING OTHERS IS THE PATHWAY TO OUR OWN FORGIVENESS

Warnings about judging others abound in the Gospels — "He who is without sin, let him cast the first stone." (St. John 8:7) "By what measure you judge, you shall be judged." (St. Matthew 7: 1). Of all human faults, our Lord condemned hypocrisy the most — "Woe to you, you scribes and Pharisees, you hypocrites!" (St. Matthew 23:13). The wicked servant of our Lord's parable, of whom we heard from today's Gospel passage, is yet one more figure to be condemned by our Lord for his hypocrisy. As much as he wanted mercy from his king — and even received it — he did not show mercy to his fellow servant.

It is only when we can read the Bible and apply it to ourselves, rather than using it to judge others, that we can realize our own flaws, weaknesses and sins, and, in this way, avoid the grave sin of hypocrisy, while growing spiritually. It is only then that we can be serious about repentance, which is always a matter of praying for ourselves and others rather than justifying ourselves and condemning others.

If we believe in God, we must believe in forgiveness. But, if we truly believe in forgiveness, we must believe that forgiving others is the pathway to our own forgiveness. Our Lord defines forgiveness through today's Gospel passage — that being, the total cancellation of all debt as if it never existed. An image of such innocent forgiveness can be found among small children who have not yet learned from adults how to hold grudges. Such an image shows that we have it in us to be able to forgive; we most often choose not to. Choosing not to carries dire consequences, as we understand from reading the Bible. It is critical, then, that we truly apply the Bible to ourselves, rather than using it to condemn others. +FR. THEODORE

Τα Ευαγγέλια μας προειδοποιούν να μην καταδικάζουμε τους άλλους - «Ο αναμάρτητος υμών πρώτος βαλέτω λίθον επ΄ αυτήν.» (Ιωάν. 8:7) «Μη κρίνετε, ίνα μη κριθήτε.» (Ματθ. 7:1-3). Από όλα τα ανθρώπινα ελαττώματα, ο Κύριός μας καταδίκασε περισσότερο την υποκρισία — «Ουαί δε υμίν γραμματείς και Φαρισαίοι υποκριταί!» (Ματθ. 23:13). Ο πονηρός υπηρέτης της παραβολής του Κυρίου, γιά τον οποίον ακούσαμε από τη σημερινή περικοπή του Ευαγγελίου, είναι ακόμη ένας άλλος που καταδικάσθηκε από τον Κύριο γιά την υποκρισία του. Όσο κι αν ήθελε έλεος από τον βασιλέαν του — και μάλιστα το έλαβε — δεν έδειξε έλεος στον συνδούλο του.

Μόνο όταν μπορούμε να διαβάσουμε την Αγία Γραφή και να την εφαρμόσουμε στον εαυτό μας, αντί να την χρησιμοποιήσουμε για να κατακρίνουμε τους άλλους, μπορούμε να συνειδητοποιήσουμε τα δικά μας ελαττώματα, αδυναμίες και αμαρτίες, και, με αυτόν τον τρόπο, να αποφύγουμε το βαρύ αμάρτημα της υποκρισίας, ενώ ωριμάζουμε στην πνευματική ζωή. Μόνο τότε μπορούμε να μετανοήσουμε για τις αμαρτίες μας με σοβαρό τρόπο, που πάντοτε είναι θέμα προσευχής για τον εαυτό μας και γιά τους άλλους, παρά ζήτημα δικαιολογήσεως του εαυτού μας και καταδίκης των άλλων.

Αν πιστεύουμε στον Θεό, πρέπει να πιστεύουμε στη συγχώρεση. Αλλά, αν πιστεύουμε αληθινά στη συγχώρεση, πρέπει να πιστεύουμε ότι το να συγχωρούμε τους άλλους είναι και ο δρόμος προς τη δική μας συγχώρεση. Ο Χριστός μας ορίζει τη συγχώρεση μέσω της σημερινής περικοπής του Ευαγγελίου - οτι είναι η πλήρης διαγραφή όλου του χρέους σαν να μην υπήρχε ποτέ. Μιά εικόνα τέτοιας αθώας συγχώρεσεως ευρίσκεται ανάμεσα σε μικρά παιδιά που δεν έχουν μάθει ακόμη από τους μεγαλους πώς να κρατούν κακία. Μιά τέτοια εικόνα δείχνει ότι έχουμε την έμφυτη ικανότητα να συγχωρούμε. Ωστόσο, τις περισσότερες φορές επιλέγουμε να μην συγχωρούμε. Η επιλογή να μην συγχωρούμε τους άλλους έχει τρομερές συνέπειες, όπως καταλαβαίνουμε από την ανάγνωση της Αγίας Γραφής. Είναι κρίσιμο, λοιπόν, να εφαρμόζουμε αληθινά την Αγία Γραφή στον εαυτό μας, αντί να την χρησιμοποιούμε για να καταδικάζουμε τους άλλους.




