PRAYER FOR READING HOLY SCRIPTURES

"Shine within our hearts, loving Master, the pure light of Your divine knowledge and open the eyes of our minds that we may comprehend the message of Your Gospel. Instill in us, also, reverence for Your blessed commandments, so that having conquered sinful desires, we may pursue a spiritual life, thinking and doing all these things that are pleasing to You. For You are the Light of our souls and bodies and to You we give glory together with Your Father Who is without beginning and Your all-holy, good, and life-giving Spirit, now and forever and to the ages of ages. Amen."

EPISTLE—Colossians 2: 8-12

Brethren, see to it that no one makes a prey of you by philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, and you have come to fullness of life in him, who is the head of all rule and authority. In him also you were circumcised with a circumcision made without hands, by putting off the body of flesh in the circumcision of Christ; and you were buried with him in baptism, in which you were also raised with him through faith in the working of God, who raised him from the dead.

GOSPEL-St. Luke 2: 20-21;40-52

At that time, the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them. And at the end of eight days, when he was circumcised, he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb. And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him. Now his parents went to Jerusalem every year at the

feast of the Passover. And when he was twelve years old, they went up according to custom; and when the feast was ended, as they were returning, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem. His parents did not know it, but supposing him to be in the company they went a day's journey, and they sought him among their kinsfolk and acquaintances; and when they did not find him, they returned to Jerusalem, seeking him. After three days, they found him in the temple, sitting among the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions; and all who heard him were amazed at his understanding and his answers. And when they saw him they were astonished; and his mother said to him, "Son, why have you treated us so? Behold, your father and I have been looking for you anxiously." And he said to them, "How is it that you sought me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" And they did not understand the saying which he spoke to them. And he went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom and in stature, and in favor with God and man.

CIRCUMCISION OF OUR LORD - Today we commemorate the Circumcision of our Lord. Since the Mosaic Law commands that if a woman gives birth to a male child, he should be circumcised in the foreskin of his flesh on the eighth day (Lev. 12:2-3), on this, the eighth day from His Nativity, our Savior accepted the circumcision commanded by the Law. According to the command of the Angel, He received the Name which is above every name: *JESUS*, which means "Savior."

A NOVEL NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION

Through his Epistle to the Colossians, St. Paul pleads with us today to not be duped into the false thinking of politics, philosophy and "the elemental spirits of the universe." As baptized Greek Orthodox Christians, we pledged ourselves to join ourselves to Christ. Joining ourselves to Christ means that we seek the guidance from the Holy Spirit, which is a guidance that supersedes political views, philosophical trends, as well as even much of today's technology — the most recent "spirit of the universe."

Care for the spiritual lives of our children is an urgent matter. Children are being subjected to teachings that are in conflict with those of our Church. For one, where humility drew people to accept responsibilities toward God and others, pride draws people to insist on a never-ending list of "rights." The war between "rights" and "responsibilities" is dividing people who were once united in the Faith. Worship, for example, which was once understood as a *responsibility*, is now more a matter of a casual "right to choose." Educating our children about the Bible seems to be secondary to their involvement in secular extra-curricular activities. They are then at a disadvantage when tested by the "elemental spirits of the universe." Their ignorance in efforts to live according to our Apostolic Faith, however, can be countered by our serious participation in the Divine Liturgy every Sunday throughout the year.

Let our "New Year's Resolution" this year be one in which we commit ourselves to enthusiastic participation in the prayers of our Divine Liturgy, through which our minds are set aright and our youth can see such virtues as prayer, love, repentance and forgiveness lived out in real time. +FR. Διά μέσου της Επιστολής του προς τους Κολοσσαείς, ο Άγιος Παύλος μας παρακαλεί σήμερα να μην ξεγελασθούμε από τις ψευδείς ιδεολογίες που προέρχονται από τις πολιτικές θεωρίες, την κοσμική φιλοσοφία και τα «στοιχειώδη πνεύματα του σύμπαντος». Ως βαπτισμένοι Έλληνο-Ορθόδοξοι, υποσχεθήκαμε να ενωθούμε με τον Χριστό. Το να ενωθούμε με τον Χριστό σημαίνει ότι αναζητούμε συνεχώς την καθοδήγηση του Άγιου Πνεύματος, που αντικαθιστά τις πολιτικές απόψεις, τις φιλοσοφικές τάσεις, καθώς ακόμη και πολλά «θέματα» της σημερινής τεχνολογίας - το πιό πρόσφατο «πνεύμα του σύμπαντος».

Η φροντίδα για την πνευματική ζωή των παιδιών μας είναι επείγον ζήτημα. Τα παιδιά υποβάλλονται σε διδασκαλίες που έρχονται σε σύγκρουση με αυτές της Εκκλησίας μας. Πρώτον, όπου η ταπεινοφροσύνη ώθησε τους ανθρώπους να αποδεχθούν ευθύνες απέναντι στον Θεό και συνανθρώπους, η υπερηφάνεια ωθεί τους ανθρώπους να επιμείνουν σε έναν ατελείωτο κατάλογο «δικαιωμάτων». Ο πόλεμος μεταξύ «δικαιωμάτων» και «ευθύνων» διχάζει τους ανθρώπους. Η λατρεία, για παράδειγμα, Συνέχεια στην επόμενη σελίδα – – – ->

που κάποτε θεωρούνταν ευθύνη, τώρα είναι περισσότερο θέμα περιστασιακού «δικαιώματος επιλογής». Η εκπαίδευση των παιδιών μας σχετικά με την Αγία Γραφή φαίνεται να είναι δευτερεύουσα σε σχέση με τη συμμετοχή τους σε κοσμικές εξωσχολικές δραστηριότητες. Στη συνέχεια, ευρίσκονται σε μειονεκτική θέση όταν δοκιμάζονται από τα «στοιχειώδη πνεύματα του σύμπαντος». Η άγνοιά τους όμως προς την προσπάθεια να ζήσουν σύμφωνα με την Ορθόδοξον Πίστην μπορεί να αντιμετωπισθεί με τη σοβαρή συμμετοχή μας στη Θεία Λειτουργία κάθε Κυριακή καθ' όλη τη διάρκεια του έτους, μέσω της οποίας διορθώνονται οι διάνοιές μας και η νεολαία μπορεί να βιώσει τις αρετές όπως η προσευχή, η αγάπη, η μετάνοια και η συγχώρεση. +Ο ΠΑΤΗΡ ΘΕΟΔΩΡΟΣ

Archiepiscopal Encyclical on the New Year

Unto...the entirety of the Christ-named Plenitude of the Holy Archdiocese of America:

I, who am a creature of God, am called to be God... (PG 36, 560A).

Beloved Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On this first day of the 2023 New Year, let us invoke for inspiration in the coming year the memory of the Saint of God who reposed this day so many centuries ago: the shining Hierarch of Cappadocia and Teacher of the *oikoumene*, Basil the Great. We have many traditions around Saint Basil the Great — the giving of gifts on his Feastday, the Vasilopita, our St. Basil Academy in Garrison, New York, which is a National Institution that proudly bears his name. But beyond even these beloved traditions, we also have the legacy of this saintly hierarch, which offers us a profound understanding of what it means to be a human being.

The aforementioned quote was remembered by Saint Basil's lifelong friend, Saint Gregory the Theologian, who recalled the Saint's words in the eulogy he delivered at his funeral. Such a simple expression, and yet here, midway between the infancy of our Lord at Christmas and the fulness of His humanity at Theophany, Saint Basil reminds each of us of the nature of our high calling in Christ. Yes, we are creatures, but we are called to be God, or what the Fathers of the Church would term as *theosis*, or divinization.

Imagine the New Year of 2023 as a series of opportunities for *theosis* in your life. You do not have to be a monastic or even an ascetic to embrace this aspiration. Each moment, every encounter, all the people that you meet — they are all opportunities for you to act as God acts; to speak as God speaks; and to love as God loves.

We often hear our friends talk about their "New Year's resolutions," their intentions to either spend more time with family, to lose weight, or the thousand other commitments we try to make at the turn of the New Year. This year, though, let us follow the example of the Great Basil of Caesarea. Let us take our lives — humble and even faulted — and let us make of them a chance to become godlike in our ways. This is the realization of our human nature, created in the image and according to the likeness of the Holy Trinity, which is a communion of love.

May 2023 be filled with moments where your lives are changed and transformed by the love of God, so that you can share abundantly with the world around you the fullness of what it means to be a creature that aspires to be like our Creator.

RE: 2023 Festival Sales using CLOVER™ Registers

The 2023 St. George Festival will use <u>Credit and Debit Cards only for all transactions</u>. <u>We will not be accepting cash at our booths</u>. All transactions will be done on a CLOVER™ device designed for credit card Festival use.

You can see the devices in the Church Hall on the table next to the Sunday School Rooms.

Sales and Transactions are immediately recorded to the correct account eliminating the need for Office Staff, Runners, and Night Cash Deposits during the Festival. Without cash on the premises, risk of robbery and theft is eliminated, and accounting accuracy is greatly improved.

Festivals using this method have seen dramatic increases in sales as the customer is not limited to the cash they have on hand. In addition, there will be a "TIP" screen at food and bar locations which has been proven to increase sales as well.

Chairman and Register workers will need to attend a brief "hands on" training session lasting less than 30 minutes during January and early February. The stations are very intuitive with ICONS and Menu Items already pre-loaded onto the screens. The station operation is very similar to your Smart Phone.

The training schedule will be posted in the 1st issue of the 2023 Ladder. A single session should be sufficient however users are welcome to attend more than 1 for additional training.

During the Festival, we will have on-site support people available for questions from open to close.

The registers can track SALES, VOID transactions, and provide REFUNDS in real time.

Our goal is to improve sales efficiency while reducing office staffing.
